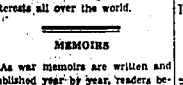

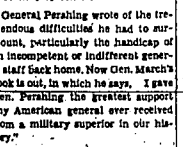
Twins And Beauty Queen At Meeting

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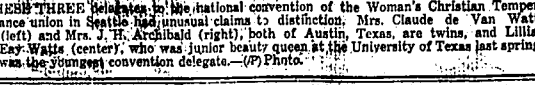
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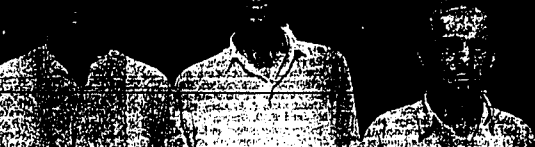

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### Deer Flourish in Minidoka Forest

BURLEY, Aug. 19 (Special to The News)—Deer in the Minidoka National Forest are fat and healthy, and there is plenty of feed and water for them, reports R. H. Parish, game warden in charge. He believes the animals will stay in the winter in better condition than for many seasons past.

Parish has made an investigation of the condition of these animals in the Minidoka point district, south of Burley. He examined seven of the animals at close range, getting within 100 yards of them and using a field glass. The deer heads he saw were in excellent condition. He saw a number of deer that were lame and without fear of the hunter, saying their visitors with mild interest and lazily walking off into the brush when approached by the warden. The deer were carrying immense horns, their antlers in the velvet giving them the appearance of small size. ### GRANGEVILLE HOLDS SWINDLER SUSPECTS

#### Authorities Here Send for Men Accused of Fraudulent Check Dealings

Two men accused of using false representations to secure checks from a number of Twin Falls county citizens, have been arrested at Grangeville, Idaho, and are to be brought here to stand trial on a felony charge. It was stated at the sheriff's office here last evening.

In a complaint filed in the probate court here yesterday, the accused men Ray L. McDonald and M. Hanson are alleged to have given an insufficient-fund check for \$15 to a local service station on Saturday of last week, receiving a check in exchange to the full amount of \$15 for it.

The author of the check signed the complaint.

This check and others, according to the sheriff's statement, were procured by the accused men from persons who were led to believe that they were signing receipts in connection with a deal for automobile or health and accident insurance. The sheriff said three persons already had told a similar story of this transaction to the authorities here, and that others probably have had a similar experience.

### BURGULARS HAMMER GARAGE SAFE OPEN

#### Cracksmen at Nelson-Jenkins Office, Make Away With Liberty Bonds and Cash

Burglars who broke into the Nelson-Jenkins, Incorporated, garage, 312 Main avenue west, sometime Thursday night, used a sledge hammer to crack open the office safe from which they carried away \$200 in Liberty bonds and approximately \$100 in cash, according to report made to the police and sheriff's office early Friday morning.

Several checks which there was a \$20 bill, were not disturbed. Investigating officers believed the burglars entered the garage through a window at the rear where a heavy door has been set up after glass was broken out recently, and that the burglars replaced the door after entering the garage so that nothing unusual was observed by passing motorists.

Olen G. Jenkins, a member of the firm, told officers he had heard a sound as though a workman were wielding a hammer when he returned to the garage about 11 o'clock Thursday night, and that he went into the shop department, but did not go into the office. Officers expressed belief Mr. Jenkins heard the burglars hammering at the safe, and that he probably would have been attacked if he had happened to carry his investigation into the office at that time.

An employee coming to work shortly before 8 o'clock Friday morning found the safe open, and called the police.

### VALUATION FIGHT LOWERS TAX BILL

#### Twin Falls County Assessor Tells Argument That Led State Board to Rescind

S. Claid Stewart, Twin Falls county assessor, accused a reduction of some \$300,000 from the total of 1932 taxes to be paid in Twin Falls county, when he persuaded the state board of equalization in session at Boise last Thursday to rescind its action of the day before said give up its purpose to put a 5 per cent increase on the assessor's valuation of Twin Falls county's irrigated lands.

Mr. Stewart, who had attended the board's sessions last week and returned to Boise as soon as it became known here that the board had voted to increase the irrigated lands valuation, returned home last evening.

Showing of a great volume of Twin Falls county lands classified as irrigated lands, Mr. Stewart said, seemed to be most effective in leading the board to rescind the 5 per cent increase. Twin Falls county has classified as irrigated lands approximately 320,000 acres, including a considerable amount of land with water rights that are less dependable and less valuable than those under the Twin Falls canal system. The assessor had placed an average valuation of a little more than \$40 per acre on Twin Falls county lands classified as irrigated lands.

Governor C. Ben Ross left the board meeting before noon Thursday to attend a gentlemen's picnic at Caldwell, and did not vote on the proposition to rescind the 5 per cent increase placed on Twin Falls county's irrigated lands, Mr. Stewart said. Other members of the board are the secretary of state, state auditor, state treasurer and attorney general.

With the exception of 20 per cent reduction ordered by the state board in valuation of milk cows, the state board has made no change in Twin Falls county's abstract of valuations for this year, Mr. Stewart said.

Interment is to be in Twin Falls cemetery beside the grave of Mrs. Sampson, who died here last Sunday.

Mr. Sampson is survived by five children, three sons, Orlan, Rogerson, Hansen; Willis Sampson, Hansen; Stacy Sampson, Kimberly; and two daughters, Mrs. Mary Grundy Sampson, Kimberly, and Mrs. Adel Frank, Eugene, Saskatchewan, Canada. He leaves to one brother, G. G. Sampson, Butte, Arkansas.

Mr. Sampson was born in Oardville, England, in 1851, a son of Thomas and Mary Grundy Sampson. He was one of a family of six sons and two daughters. When he was seven years old the family came to the United States, and the father, who had served as a Methodist minister, was employed as a miner for about seven years in Pennsylvania and Maryland, coal fields before moving to Iowa.

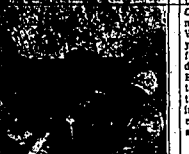
