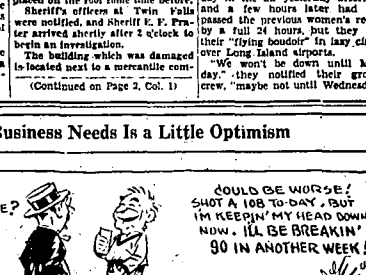

### BURLEY OFFICIALS HOLD FARM TOUR

Amalgamated Sugar Company Conducts First Inspection of Oakley Valley

BURLEY, Aug. 20 (Special to The News)—Local officials of the Amalgamated Sugar company held their first tour of the Oakley valley district Thursday, sponsored by W. W. Palmer, county agricultural agent. Members of the district were taken in automobiles to several farms in the valley where crop conditions were studied and explained, and were guests of the sugar company at a chicken dinner at the Westgate hotel.

Beet fields were found to be almost universally in excellent condition, although some planted rather late. Other crops, where proper seed had been used, good cultural customs followed and weeding done, made good crops. Some fields were looking better than for several years past. One of the outstanding features of the farming was the use of good seed, was strongly brought out.

Potato fields were visited where it was plainly evident of the advantage of first-class certified seed above good appearing local seed, in fact, however, many districts of certified seed rows were filled with a good stand of healthy vines, while the poor seed showed up in rows of withered and curly leafed vines infected with mosaic and other serious diseases. The same effect was shown in bean fields, where resistant seed had produced heavily podded vines, in strong contrast to rows of straggling vines from commercial seed of ordinary character.

The garden of John Adams, early Oakley settler and orchardist, was visited. All sorts of garden truck, well cared for, was here shown, including a large bush of tomatoes, which had been imported from Spain. The value of back locusts for farm use was also pointed out.

It was shown here, as Mr. Adams showed doubtless made in locust wood which had been in use many years.

A field of Victory oats, from seed grown and certified in the valley, was visited on the Parley Matthews place. It was judged that this field would yield in excess of 100 bushels to the acre. The Ed Hunter place purchased sheep were seen and the poultry farm of Gus Wahlstrom was also visited.

It was shown that Wahlstrom, although caring for him from 800 to 900 laying hens, made good profits from them by himself up in business and make a good living. He bought all his feed from his chickens, even in these times of low egg prices, by raising quality eggs and keeping his hens up to from 80 to 90 per cent production. His eggs marketed graded 50 per cent extra.

It was also shown that the soil on the Oakley valley soil to be well adapted to growing this product, probably better than the Minidoka project as a whole. All beet fields were unusually good, with the prospect of harvesting a profitable crop even although the best cultural practices for raising this crop had not in every case been used.

The dinner was in charge of Manager R. O. May, of the sugar company, who urged farmers not to act idly by and expect the government to solve their problems without doing something themselves to reduce costs of crop production. He called on Ezra T. Benson, extension farm management specialist, who also recommended lowering costs of production. Other talkers were W. W. Palmer, H. O. McCulloch and L. E. Swetzer.

but the great mass of average American men and women, who are not ashamed to repeat, have even forgotten by those in power.

His nine proposals are:

1. Prevention of the issuance of "manufactured and unnecessary securities of all kinds, which are brought out merely for the purpose of enriching those who handle their sale," and a requirement that all securities be legitimate securities disclosed by their bonuses and commissions.
2. Full federal regulation of "holding companies which sell securities in interstate commerce."
3. Federal authority in the regulation of "exchanges in the business of buying and selling securities and commodities."
4. More rigid supervision of national banks "for the protection of depositors."
5. Discouragement and prevention of the "unrestrained use of bank deposits in speculation, to the detriment of local credit."
6. Separation of investment banking and commercial banking.
7. Restriction of federal reserve banks, whose funds prior to 1929, "were used practically without check for many speculative purposes."

Of the other two, the governor said:

"Finally I propose two new political crimes which legislation is not required.

"They are policies of fair and open dealing on the part of the administration with the American public.

"In the first place I promise you

lets in the corporate system....

"I believe that the government, without becoming a prying bureaucracy, can act as a check on the balance to this oligarchy so as to secure initiative, life, a chance to work, and the safety of savings to men and women, rather than safety of exploitation to the exploiters....

He said he offered his "remedies" in contrast "to the complete silence" of the Republican "and in contrast to the theories of the year 1928 which I have shown that the Republican leaders still hold."

"The acceptance speech of the distinguished 'gentleman' who is running against me," he said, "is equally empty of hope on this subject."

"There is an eloquent description of the situation which we are passing; glimpses through the clouds of troubled officers passing the buck, wondering what to do; belated recognition that the storm is out of a hot current of speculation; adherence to the old policy; the outline of the ship clouded in vague phrases about the 'interests of the people'....

"Changing the figure of speech, he speaks with feeling of 'a world poisoned by speculation in which there is a heavy burden of waste, exploitation and abuse of financial power, but not of the beneficent sun of this Republic'....

"As to the claim to economic capacity, the record is completely one of regressiveness....

"The only approach to the protection of the investing public through a temporary and immediate loan is a vague reference to a 'stronger banking system'....

"The governor said he regretted the criticism of the administration, and added: "But to build we must first clear the ground....

"Both platforms and the speeches of acceptance of both candidates," he declared, "at least have agreed to the following: that the major issue in this campaign is the economic life of the country....

"His general indictment of the administration was that it "had stood the forces which were involved in the economic life of the country....

"The confidence which the administration has asked us as individual citizens to have in purchasing here, not enough. The kind of confidence we most need is confidence in the integrity, the soundness, the liberalism, the vision and the old-fashioned horse sense of our national leadership....

"Without that kind of confidence we are forever insecure. With that kind of confidence the future is ours to conquer....

that it will no longer be possible for international bankers or others to get to the investing public of American foreign securities on the implied understanding that these securities have been passed on or approved by the state department or any other agency of the federal government.

"In the second place, I assure you that high public officials in the next administration will neither by word nor deed seek to influence the prices of stocks and bonds."

The governor pointed his attack on the Hoover administration in this manner:

"I am up to the history of the last administration in four sentences.

"It encouraged speculation and over-production through its false economic policies.

"It attempted to minimize the crash and misled the people as to its gravity.

"It arrogantly charged the cause to other nations of the world.

"It refused to recognize and correct the evils at home which brought forth, delayed relief, and forgot to reform."

Before laying his "remedies" Governor Roosevelt outlined what he called his "economic creed," five "beliefs" on which he said he based his proposals.

"I believe," he said, "in individualism; but I mean it in everything the word implies.

"I believe that our industrial and economic system is made for individual men and women, and not individual men and women for the benefit of the system.

"I believe that the individual should have full liberty of action to make the most of himself, but I do not believe that in the name of that sacred word a few powerful interests should be permitted to make industrial conditions of the lives of that vast population of the United States.

"I believe in the sacredness of private property, which means I do not believe it should be subjected to the ruthless manipulation of professional speculators in the stock mar-

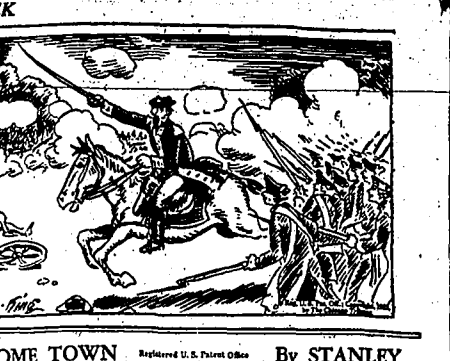
