Alice Paul, Most Militant Of American Feminists, Recalls Victory 12 Years Ago

EFFORTS NOW CENTER ON WORLD SUFFRAGE

Leader Obtains Permanent Geneva Headquarters To Carry on Drive

For the last two weeks, Mrs. McCormick assailed her physicians with her will power in recovering from relapses which they expected to prove fatal. All hope was abandoned only a few hours before the arrival of John D. Rockefeller, jr., when she lapsed into a coma. She recovered

sufficiently to embrace her brother and to confer on the following day upon business matters. She likewise recovered from another sudden sinking spell Tuesday night.

Born at Cleveland in 1872, Mrs. McCormick was the third child and youngest of the venerable Standard Oil magnate and financier who, at the age of 93, survives her. Her marriage in 1893 to Harold F. McCormick, son of Cyrus, inventor of the reaper, united two of the greatest fortunes in America.

Her first child, christened John Rockefeller, was born the year following her marriage but lived only

two years, dying of scarlet fever. His death led his parents to one of their first big philanthropic projects. They founded and endowed the John McCormick Institute of Infectious Diseases here and 20 years later Mrs. McCormick still was contributing \$25,000 annually to it. Institute scientists isolated the scarlet fever germ and, in this manner, helped reduce the country's infant mortality rate.

A few minutes after Mrs. McCormick died, relatives revealed a member of the family telephone, John D. Rockefeller, jr., at his estate in Pocantico Hills, New York.

Friends said it was extremely unlikely the elder Rockefeller would come to Chicago for the funeral, arrangements for which are to be announced later.

the nature of a "joke" "Yes."

It was not until later, the young prosecutor said, he learned Stark had been fatally injured.

Stark's death followed his arrest with three other youths on charges of robbing and assaulting Mrs. Valeria Hlensaki, a detective's mother.

One of Stark's companions, Phillip Canale, testified today he was shown how Stark had been beaten and was told he would get "the same."

Stark's sister, Mrs. Fanny Tripp, testified to identifying his body in a morgue. She was followed by Dr. Otto Schultz, who performed an autopsy the day after Stark died August 15.

Dr. Schultz described evidence of a "terrible beating." None of the numerous bruises or contusions, he said, could have caused death.

"Death was primarily due," he asserted, "to interference of the respiratory system, and that interference was due to a bi-lateral fracture of the cricoid cartilage."

The fracture, he found, was symmetrical on both sides, indicating the cartilage was burst on either side as a result of pressure being applied at the center.

Defense counsel brought out that the fracture could have been caused accidentally in that Mrs. Hlensaki, by a clenching hand. One of their sons, Joseph, grabbed Stark by the throat when he denounced him for "hitting an old woman like that."

Hlensaki is awaiting trial with six other officers on lesser charges.

By BESS FURMAN (Associated Press Feature Writer) WASHINGTON, Aug. 25—Twelve years ago August 26, Alice Paul, most militant of this country's feminists, sewed the last "ratification star" on her huge suffrage flag—the nineteenth amendment was law of the land.

No longer was it necessary for her to parade Pennsylvania avenue, picket the White House, petition the senators, or lead a jail for her pro-suffrage demonstrating. She might have been expected then to quit fighting and enjoy the fruits of victory.

Instead, today finds her firmly entrenched on a new front—the international—her objective the winning of women's rights into world law and practice.

The purple, white and gold of the woman's party banner she held aloft for suffrage, Alice Paul now displays in a window looking out upon the Rue du Mont Blanc in Geneva, Switzerland.

Just as she urged concentration on congress to achieve suffrage at a single stroke, she is now centering on sex parity, world-wide, through conventions of the League of Nations and other international groups.

Only this year has she succeeded in setting up a permanent Geneva headquarters for her group. Mrs. O. W. F. Belmont, whose generosity made possible the Woman's Party's house on Capitol Hill is again the "queen" of Washington women who followed Alice Paul to jail return from Geneva with a bit of wisdom. They talk again of the "old suffrage days." For they've been watching Alice Paul in action, with a group of busy women about her, drawing up plans, making reports and preparing arguments to be presented upon sometimes rather reluctant plenipotentiaries.

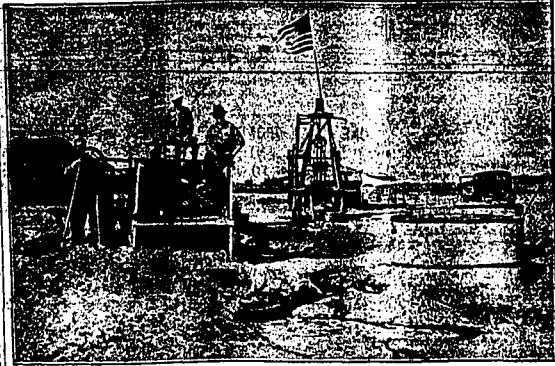

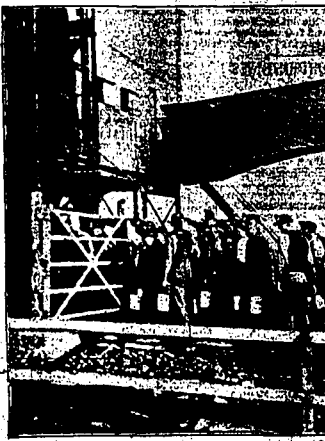

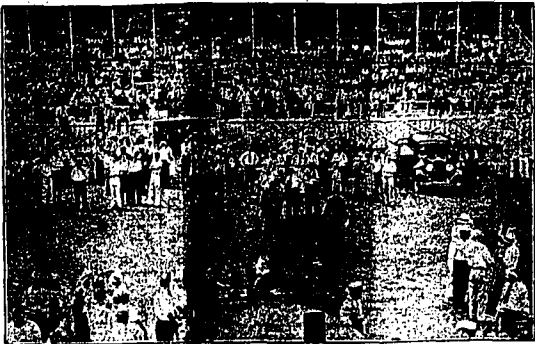

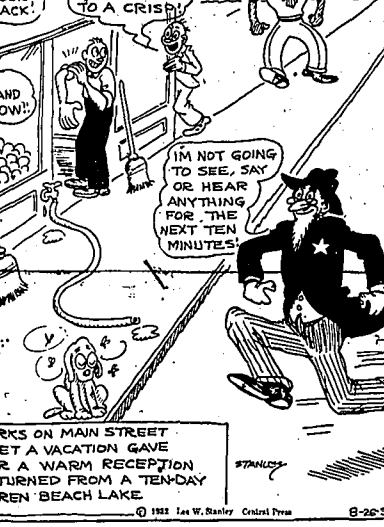
