The resolution follows: "Resolved, that in order to prevent the removal of cash from circulation and the hoarding of money which in many communities elsewhere has caused untold damage to all business and all individuals, the banks of Twin Falls county will limit the withdrawals from all checking accounts, all certificates of deposit, and all savings accounts to an amount and to exceed five per cent per month on present balances, except in the ordinary living expenses of individuals, such as money for groceries and other similar legitimate expenses."

The effect of the introduction of the plan, the primary purpose of which is to limit withdrawals for purposes of hoarding, may be summarized as follows: 1. Funds for the continued operation of normal business will be readily paid by all banks.

Officers of the banks stressed the fact that the order will not restrict additional deposits and is framed with the specific view to the full maintenance of normal business activities. The order will not be subject to the foregoing rule and will be handled in the normal routine of bank clearing.

200-MILES-HOURLY TO OBTAIN RECORD

BOSTON, Aug. 31.—Total eclipse of the sun, which has lasted with big, slow-paving clouds today, was an unexpectedly literal fulfillment of the astronomer's forecast of a "50-50 eclipse" of a total eclipse.

The clouds moved about over dozen diameters of the sun during the introduction of the sun during a heart-breaking game for astronomers, but only a thrilling gamble for spectators.

Millions of onlookers, and the corona flared between majestic clouds, a color spectacle never before seen in the United States.

Even the astronomers who were lucky will mostly not know for days, however, whether they have seen their great prizes of learning more about the sun's rays have succeeded.

Those whose eyes saw a perfect eclipse today will have their photographic plates registered a night haze, which means complete ruin to the plates.

To catch their plates must go back to laboratories for microscopic study.

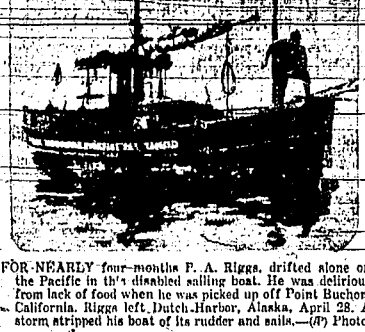

DISPUTE OVER DAM
IN SUPREME COURT

Twin Falls Canal Company
Seeks Decision in Suit
Against Reservoir Area

The Twin Falls Canal Company has filed a petition for summary judgment in the supreme court, asking that the court decide in its favor the right of the company to use the water of the Snake river above the dam which it has a right to do without compensation from the state. The reason that Snake river is a public stream and a water user is entitled to use the water without compensation to prior appropriators. The court also held that the United States government was the real party in interest and not the reservoir district. Further, the court held that the contract with the North Side Canal Company which granted it the right to use the water of the Snake river, and that the use in this respect does not interfere with the right of the Twin Falls Canal Company to any extent. The Twin Falls Canal Company is asking for judgment in favor of the United States review of the decision of the circuit court of appeals, and is contending that the Snake river is a public stream. The court in fact use Miller dam is a part of the Snake river system and the real party in interest, but only the contractor under the reclamation act, who is constructing the system for the Snake river. The court has held the contract with the North Side Canal Company, insofar as it attempts to grant any right to use the water of the Snake river, is void, and in violation of the property rights of the Twin Falls Canal Company.
