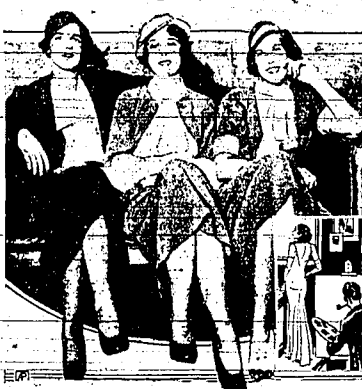

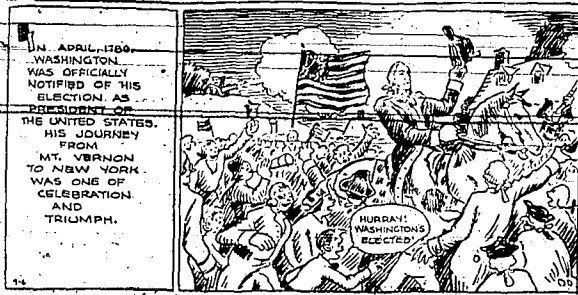
"However, to Set It Up As A Permanent Program for All Industries Would Be Uneconomic," Says Expert

WASHINGTON, Sept. 5 (Special to The News).—The five-day work week, working in shorter rotating weeks, part-time employment features and other expedients are helpful in emergency measures but not sufficient to overcome the employment crisis. They may, however, be of assistance as work-sharing measures in conjunction with a concerted movement to increase the total number of employees through the Emergency Quota Plan which has been described in previous articles. This plan would give all employers the option of hiring a given quota of unemployed or paying the equivalent as a special tax. With all rotating work-weeks at the same time, general buying would be at the expense of the employees and the workers would benefit. The emergency plan would become a permanent program by the purpose would automatically go out of existence.

Use Of Leisure Time
The time saved when the shorter work-week will be an economic proposition as the use of leisure time. When it can only be used for a few days, it will not be used at all. It will be used in other ways, such as in the purchase of goods, and the public should be alive to this problem now. It is better used in proper proportion for the public interest, education and self-improvement. It will be a benefit. If used only for excitement, distraction, and dissipation, it will undermine the moral fiber of the nation.

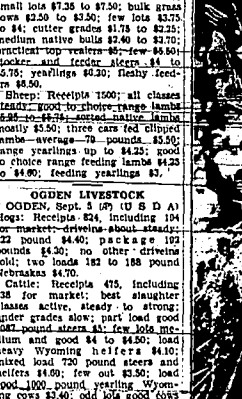

WOMAN DIES FROM GUNSHOT

Mrs. Jessie M. Bascom, Twin Falls Resident Since 1919, Succumbs at Apartments

Mrs. Jessie M. Bascom, 44, wife of Eugene S. Bascom, of the foundation of the Western Hotelting works in Twin Falls, and a resident here since 1919, was found dead in her apartment on a shopping street east shortly after noon Sunday. A bullet wound through the heart caused instant death, as was ascertained after the body was disinterred. Near the body was a cartridge containing a spent bullet and a note which was discovered. A note also was found, in which Mrs. Bascom, according to the physician, indicated her intention to take her own life. She was a widow and had been married to her late husband for 15 years. She was the daughter of Dr. J. M. Bascom, now in Holbrook, Ariz. Mrs. Bascom had been subject to severe headaches for a number of years, friends said. She had suffered with a particularly severe headache Saturday evening. Mrs. Bascom said she prepared breakfast Sunday morning, but ate nothing. 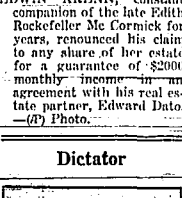

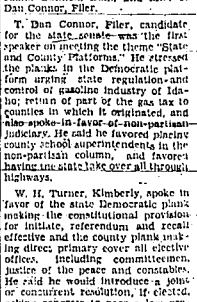
