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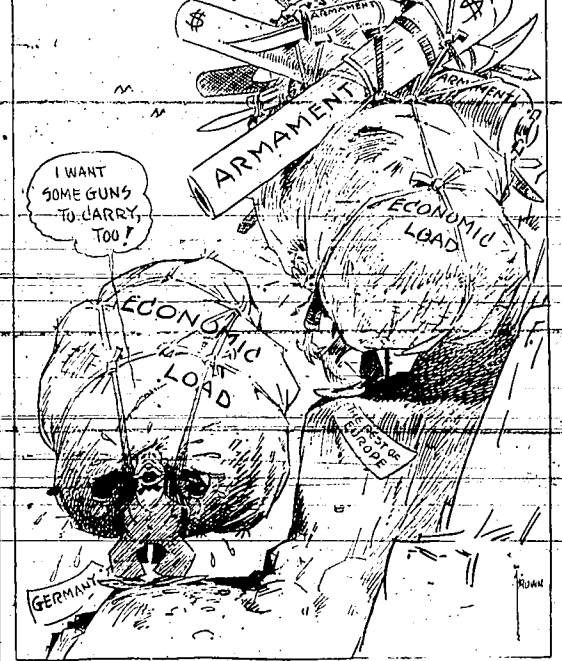
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# 4-H CLUBS AND FUTURE FARMERS OPEN FILER FAIR

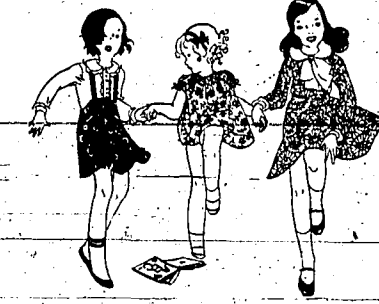

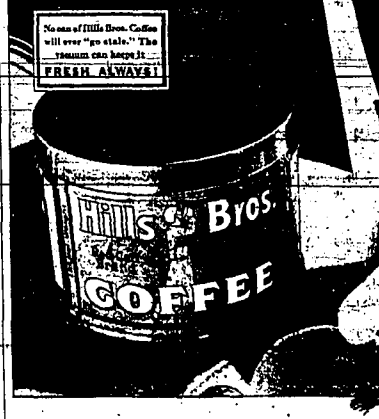

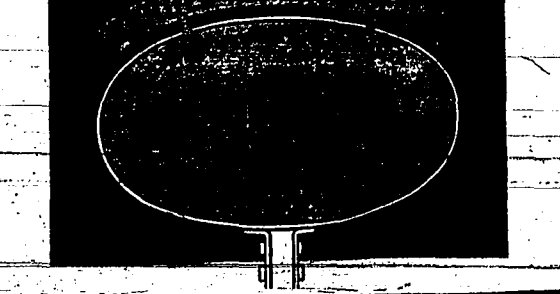

**SPEAKERS EXPLAIN PLANS TO FINANCE PURCHASE OF LAMBS**  
200 Persons in Twin Falls  
And 100 in Buhl Hear Explanation of Methods Necessary to Secure Funds

Plans for financing purchase of lambs to consume surplus feed through affiliation with the Intermountain Livestock Association were outlined last night at a meeting in the district court room of the Twin Falls county court house attended by about 200 persons.

Speakers included E. H. Jacob, Salt Lake City, manager of the Intermountain Livestock Association, who explained the plan; E. P. Rinehart, Boise, livestock specialist; and Louis Campbell, Twin Falls, commissioner of agriculture, and Harvey S. Hale, Twin Falls county agricultural agent.

Mr. Hale, who presided and who recently made a trip through eastern Oregon and Idaho, said that the livestock surplus problem is more than a local one. He said that it would be necessary to act in a coordinated way in order to get enough lambs to take the larger surplus of feed in this section. Contracts for lambs were not available, he said.

Mr. Rinehart gave a talk on the need for financing the study and application are necessary for proper feeding. 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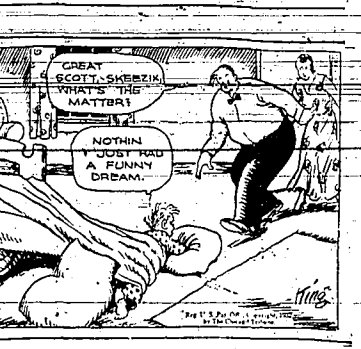

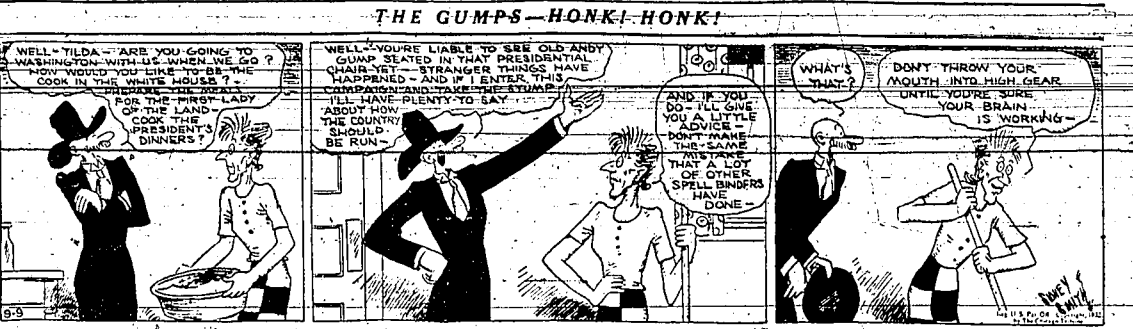
