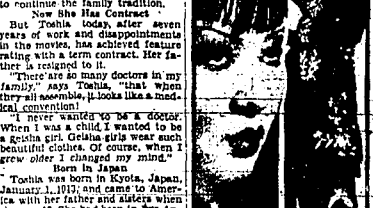

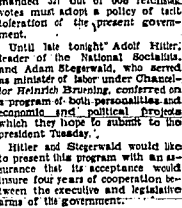

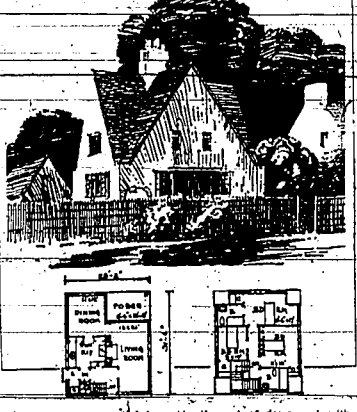

CONSTRUCTION OF \$300,000 FEDERAL HATCHERY BEGINS

Force of Men Starts Work Upon Modern Building to Provide for Rearing of 5,000,000 Fish at Once

A force of eight or ten men will begin Monday clearing the site for a \$300,000 capacity, \$100 federal fish hatchery on the old Bickel ranch near Thousand Springs; machinery will be during the work and actual preliminary building operations will probably start by September 20. It was stated last evening by S. R. Russell, Seattle, field superintendent of the federal bureau of fisheries who is in charge of the beginning of construction work.

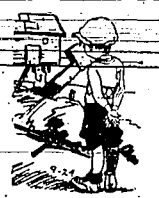
The hatchery, which will be approximately 40 by 120 feet in size, will be built on a concrete floor and will be concrete up to the windows; the rest of the building will be frame, he said. It is to be finished to finish the concrete work this winter and the extent of progress will depend on the time when hard frosts begin. There will be some work going on during the rest of the winter, however, he said. A frame house probably will be built for the hatchery superintendent, and a small frame house will be erected for the fish collector.

\$50,000 Appropriation

The original appropriation amounting to \$50,000 of this about \$18,000 was spent in purchasing the land and other expenses in connection with securing title and making the transfer. Retrenchment policies resulted in a cut of 10 per cent or about \$5000, and making other necessary deductions of various kinds there will be about \$30,000 available for the hatchery, he stated. 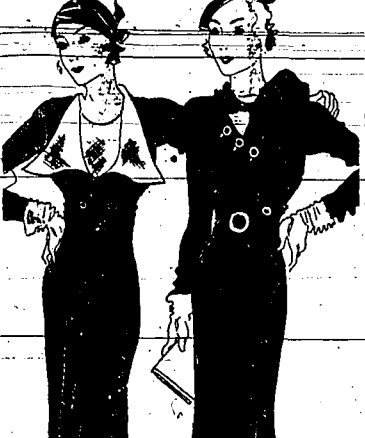
