ON ARMS QUESTION
Central European Power's Demand for Equality in Armament Receives Enthusiastic Endorsement

LONDON, Sept. 15.—Germany's demand for equality in armaments received enthusiastic support today from Arthur Henderson, president of the world disarmament conference. Speaking before the national peace council, Mr. Henderson, who is the secretary of the British labor cabinet, called upon the allied powers of the world war to carry out the disarmament provisions of the treaty of Versailles. "Why shouldn't the world war allies get together and consider what was said in their names in 1919 must bind them?" Mr. Henderson asked.

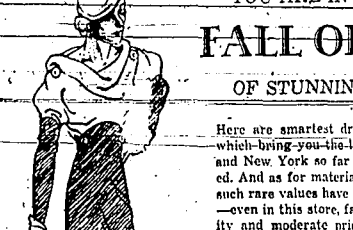

Babson Looks For Improvement In Car Industry As Result Of Low Inventories And Optimism

Statistician Declares That Current Production Being Low, Sales Small, And Profit Margins Narrow No Reasons For Being Pessimistic About Manufacture of Vehicle

BABSON HARK, Mass. Sept. 15.—Merely because current production is very low, sales small, and profit margins narrow is no reason for being pessimistic about the automobile industry. This is water over the dam, however, the industry is in a much healthier position than it was a few years ago. Manufacturers had gone ahead making more cars than the public could buy.

"Instead, they curtailed and presented cars from accumulating excessive stocks as a result of low sales. The trade is now getting ready to start buying cars again, and an optimistic for the following year."

Inflation drastic

The present rate of automobile production is 50 per cent below last year and the record since 1918. This means that all of the war and post-war expansion has been wiped out. However, the total wealth of the country is far above its level in 1929. The automobile mobile expansion was overdone in 1922 and 1929 so contraction has been a natural outcome from this condition is to be expected. The automobile industry is subject to the same as every other industry.

Large Potential Replacement

In 1921 for the first time in the history of the automobile industry, the abandonment of cars was greater than the purchase of new cars. According to some authorities there was an estimated shortage in replacements of 670,000 cars last year, which is 65 per cent of the total output in the first seven months of 1932. This is a shortage in normal replacement demand and does not take into account prospective new purchasers. From January to July of this year production has been 424,239 cars, which is lower than even the 1921 output, and back to pre-war levels.

Need Greater As Ever

As confidence and purchasing power improve it will be found that need and desire for motor cars is as strong as ever. So finally entrenched is this great industry in our economic and social life that it will continue to expand with the growth of the country. All this is waiting for now is improvement in general buying power.

Those who have been forced to run their cars 10 years instead of seven or five years instead of three will enter the market for the new model. It used to be estimated that the average life of a motor car was seven years, but this depression has stretched it out to eight and one-half years. The limit has about been reached and it is waiting for now is improvement in general buying power.

Prices are Lowest in History

The forces of depression have caused manufacturers to reduce prices to the lowest in the history of the industry. To the credit of the manufacturers it is said that they have not sacrificed quality for price, but are giving the best value for the money at much lower prices. It cannot be doubted that with improvement in general buying power the purchasing power the public will grasp these values, perhaps more rapidly than many now expect.
