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NEW BEANS PROVE OF HIGH QUALITY

C. R. Detweiler Ships First Car of 1932 Crop to Leave Vicinity of Twin Falls

The first car of new beans shipped from this territory was sent out yesterday by the C. R. Detweiler company. The beans were all first grade, and were grown by three farmers.

Cleaning of the beans resulted in loss of only 2 to 4 per cent, as compared with as much as 12 per cent in past years. Mr. Detweiler explained that this lighter loss is due to better care in harvesting, and efficient threshing machines.

Shipment is at least two weeks later than the first bean shipments usually leave the tract; but because of the weather the crop will be in the warehouses within a short time.

With anything like normal conditions, continued Mr. Detweiler, the price for our beans. The price trend since threshing began has been downward which always happens in the supply.

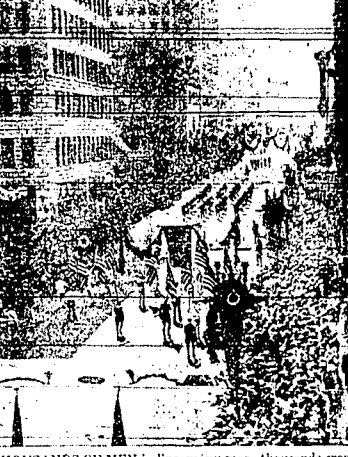

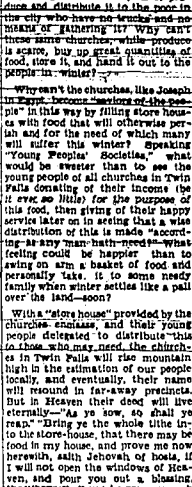

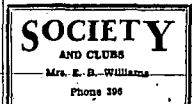
