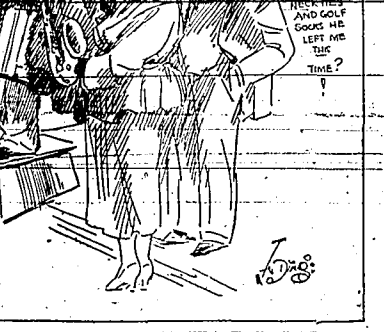
Emergency Reductions of 10 Per Cent Apply on Shipments to Los Angeles

Sogginness of Steel Issues, Notably United States Preferred, Imposes Drag

By JOHN L. COUDRY (Associated Press Staff Writer) NEW YORK, Sept. 19—Sogginness of steel issues, notably United States preferred with lower 7-point, imposed a drag on the stock market today and lower prices were the rule in most directions. Lower averaged into a net decline of 1.3 points.

Trading was the dullest in about two months, but the 100,000 share changing hands. Bonds also were quiet. Wheat and cotton, which were firm, were the only commodities showing a slight advance before closing time, although cotton managed to show something to the good.

In the absence of fresh developments pertaining to industrial prospects, Wall Street was forced to look back at trends and covering friends of the past week. However, the favorable implications of the car industry's statement, which was a report that steel production had reached a trifle, the fact that steel was in demand but it was not being suggested to most traders and other holders of steel shares that the anticipated September boom had been sidetracked.

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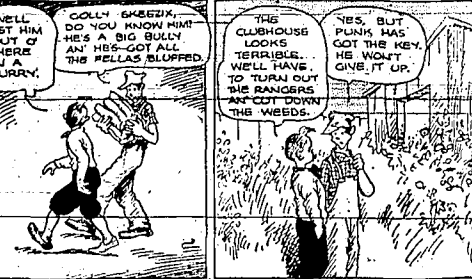

WHEAT QUOTATIONS SLUMP IN CHICAGO

Grain Close Nervous at Almost Day's Low, 5-8 to 1 Cent Under Previous

By JOHN P. BOUGHAN (Associated Press Market Editor) CHICAGO, Sept. 19—Grain prices tumbled today, affected by weakness of securities, increase of United States wheat value supply and persistent drought here.

Winnipeg reported arrivals of 4000 cars of wheat, against 2070 a week ago and only 854 at this time last year, and the Spanish wheat crop was reported 20,000,000 bushels larger than a year ago.

Sharp Breaks Sharp breaks of nearly 2 cents in wheat prices toward the last were quickly followed by a recovery that resulted largely from unfavorable weather in Canada and the United States. The group plan to meet on Oct. 1 at Chicago.
