Monthly Review Shows Decided Improvement in Gold Situation and Decrease in Credit Needs

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Sept. 20.—A decided improvement in the world gold situation, an increase in the metal held in the United States and a decrease in federal credit needs were reported today in the monthly review of the Federal Reserve Board.

The board said that the gold stock in the United States at the end of August was \$1,175,000,000, the board said. This is an increase of \$100,000,000 over the amount at the end of July.

NEW YORK, Sept. 20.—Government lawyers called today to testify in the federal court today to recall the "drawing" which the prosecutor charged was "lottery."

Members of the Royal Order of Moose, of which Senator Davis is director general, told about the charity balls held throughout the country in 1920 and 1921, promotion articles and contracts for them and other matters.

But most of them said they did not remember that Senator Davis had anything to do with these activities.

The witnesses said they did not know of any of the drawings for which the government contends were part of a gigantic lottery in violation of federal laws, in which each ticket was worth \$100,000.

Senator Davis, however, testified that he had no knowledge of any of the drawings or of the money raised by them.

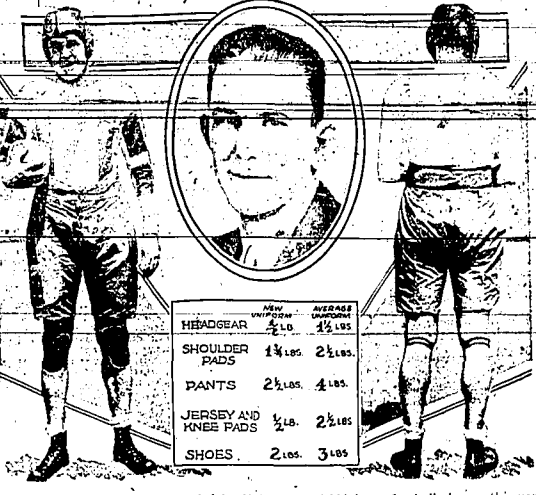

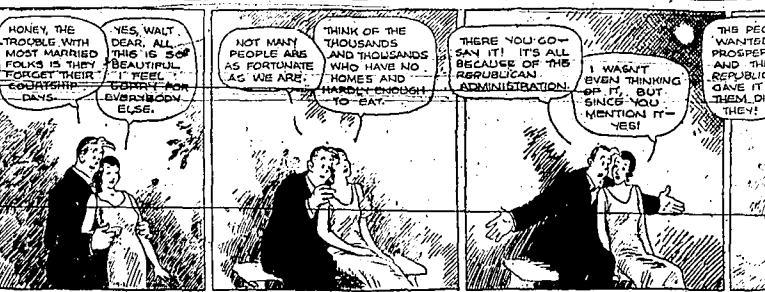

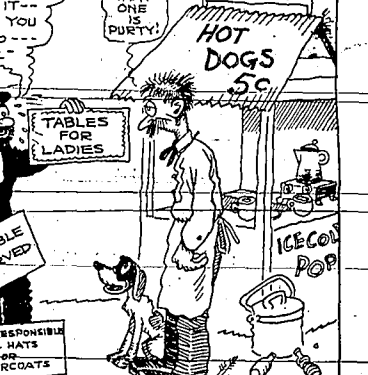

TWIN FALLS SCHOOL ENROLLMENT GAINS

Increase Over Last Year In Public and Parochial Institutions Amounts to 61

There are now 3141 students registered in the Twin Falls district public schools, according to figures compiled last night, against 3068 on October 19, 1931 at the close of the first six-week period of a full year.

There are 125 pupils registered in St. Edward's Catholic parochial school, a gain of 18 over last year leaving a total increase of 61 in the school population. Many more students are expected to be registered before the end of the first period in the public school and the second quarter in St. Edward's school.

The high school shows the largest gain, with 934 students against 894 at the close of the first period last year. The junior high school has 809 students against 890 last year; the Lincoln school has 520 pupils against 501 last year; and the little school has 425 pupils against 415 last year. The number of pupils in the Washington school drops from 459 last year to 409 this year on account of the sixth grade pupils to the Junior high school.

The following is the division of classes in the high school: 10th grade, 193; 11th, 165; 12th, 150; sophomores, 250; freshmen, 287; post gradates, 34.

The public school system is being operated this year with five fewer teachers than last year. Superintendent Smith said. There are the same number in the grade schools; the reduction in teaching staff is in the high and junior high schools.
