His selection by the committee as candidate for governor gave a head to the ticket which had been lacking since Barzilla W. Clark, Idaho Falls, withdrew after being nominated by the convention last May.

The committee named William Gooding, Gooding county, as the Liberty party candidate for Second district congressman.

### COUNTY REDUCES STORAGE RENTALS

Three-Bean Dealers Secure Fairgrounds Buildings At Lower Rate for Season

Twin Falls county, like many another landlord during the past several months, has been compelled to reduce rentals so that the county commissioners yesterday secured leases on buildings on the county fairgrounds at Filer to three bean dealers at a total rental of \$145 a month as against approximately \$200 a month last year.

Retention of the bean picking industry which is estimated to be worth some \$1000 a month to the Filer district, during the fall and winter season, the commissioners had a consideration in lowering the rent to meet the bean dealers' terms. Dealers, according to county commissioners, announced it would be necessary to store beans elsewhere unless the fairgrounds buildings could be secured at a lower rental.

### CASTLEFORD MAN FACES DISTURBANCE COMPLAINT

Under leases signed yesterday, the Idaho Bean and Elevator company is to pay \$15 a month for the Merchants building in which it stored last season some 60 carloads of beans.
