### GOVERNMENT RESTS IN 'KEEPERS' TRIAL

BOISE, Sept. 22 (AP)—Defense motion for a divided verdict in favor of Joseph Keefer and J. Albert Keefer, president and cashier of the Twin Falls National bank, was taken under advisement tonight by United States District Judge C. O. Cayman.

The motion was made after the government rested its case in which it presented evidence in an effort to convict the men of the crime. The government's case was based on the misapplication of funds through honoring overdrafts of companies in which the men were interested, and making false entries in the bank ledger.

The motion was based on several grounds, that there was insufficient evidence, that Joseph Keefer merely used the alleged false reports to the government and therefore was not guilty of making false reports but merely making them, and that as part of the motion rested that Joseph Keefer had transferred his stock in the bank July 13, 1931, and therefore could not be held liable for actions in the bank subsequent to that date. A witness for the government, Thomas J. Lloyd, Twin Falls, former vice president and director of the bank, testified Keefer was in fact president of the institution until it closed last November.

The case was expected to go to the jury late tomorrow or early the next day.

### LABOR EXCHANGE PLAN WINS FAVOR AT MEETING HERE

Local farmers are willing to trade earned salmon for farm produce, and McDonald, who is in charge of the exchange, said, "A California district, also, he said, has offered to exchange oranges for Idaho beans."
