SMITH URGES SALE OF WHEAT TO CHINA

(Idaho Congressman Appeals To Reconstruction Finance Corporation for Aid)

Congressman Addison T. Smith yesterday wired the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, Washington, urging assistance in consummation of a proposed sale to China of surplus wheat in producing areas of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and western Montana. The congressman's message said:

"It is hoped under authority granted in the Reconstruction Finance Corporation act to enable the board to finance marketing of surplus grain, that the contemplated sale of 25,000,000 bushels of wheat from the Northwestern states to China may be consummated. The removal of this surplus wheat would be most beneficial to wheat growers and enable them at least to reimburse themselves to the amount expended."

Congressman Smith has been advised by an agent of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, Spokane, that the market is burdened with a surplus of wheat, approximately 80,000,000 bushels in the Northwestern areas, and that while prices already are "ruinous" yet they are "several cents above the world price."

Resolutions urging Reconstruction Finance Corporation assistance in consummating the proposed sale of wheat to China were adopted at a meeting of Spokane Thursday afternoon delegates representing producers of the various grain areas of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and western Montana.

In the opinion of these delegates, as expressed in the resolutions, consummation of the proposed sale of wheat to China is "the only solution of our marketing problem in the Pacific Northwest at this time."
