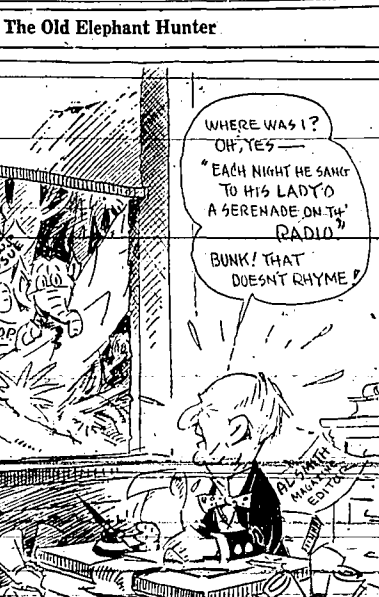

EXPLOSION RECALLS SACCO AND VANZETTI

Judge Who Presided During Much Publicized Trial Escapes Death in Blast

Worcester, Mass., Sept. 21 (AP)—Six-year-old child was crushed back into prominence today as a bomb partially wrecked the home of Judge Thayer, who presided over the trial of the two radicals.

Mrs. Thayer and her maid, Miss Kenna, were slightly injured by falling debris while the judge was trapped in his bedroom by smashed masonry and woodwork.

Six houses in the vicinity were damaged badly while windows in a street of homes in the residential wide district were broken by the force of the blast.

Explosive caused police officers to bomb communities to throw guards around the homes of President A. Lawrence Lowell, Harvard University, Governor Alvan T. Fuller and all witnesses, jurors and officials who participated in the trial of the radicals.

Police Call Expert

Memphis police directed their officers to investigate the cause of explosive used. Captain Charles Van Amburgh, state explosive expert, said it is probably dynamite was used although he was unwilling as yet to make a definite statement.

The explosion happened shortly after 4 A. M. Judge and Mrs. Thayer were sleeping on the second floor in a finished attic. Mrs. Thayer was sleeping in the bedroom while her husband was in a front room.

The force of the explosion ripped the entire floor away from under the Thayer garage, once a barn, to collapse. Plaster and masonry were blown into the air.

Thayer and a door from the back room was hurled on top of her. Her car was blown into the street. Amid falling wood and tumbling furniture he tried to reach the front door to get to his bedroom as such a wreck that he could not force his way out. Miss Kenna was trapped in the attic room as she was leading up to it was blown away.

Police found Mrs. Thayer, her husband was seen to struggle out from beneath the wreckage. They removed her and then went to the judge's home. He was taken to a hospital. Firemen placed a ladder against the house and took Miss Kenna to the hospital. She was taken from the pipes which was torn apart.

Governor Joseph E. Byrnes hurried to his home in Westfield to learn first hand of the explosion and to offer his sympathies to the Thayer family. He said he would suggest to the executive committee Friday that a reward be offered for information leading to arrest of the criminals.

Remarkably Calm

Judge Thayer remarkably calm despite his experience. He said to friends: "I hate to think that I have been so badly treated and country he gets this." Asked if he attributed the bombing to his role in the Sacco-Vanzetti trial, he said: "You can't get me to say that. That is for the police to determine."

Home Not Far

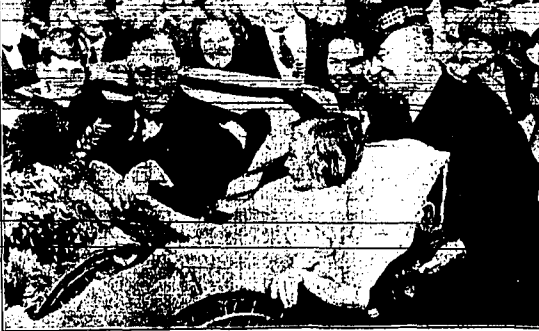
Mrs. Thayer's home, not far from Worcester Polytechnic Institute was placed under guard during the trial. She and her husband were in the electric chair by Judge Thayer in 1927 with the intention of placing a pitch the guard was maintained until about a year ago.

Woman Living Under

A woman living under Thayer's home reported that on being awakened by the blast she looked out the window to see her husband and two men seated in an automobile bearing New York registration plates. She said the men fled and she saw a woman who threw down a description of the car was sent out to police departments in the East.

Portland Man Says He Acted As Unwitting Agent in Preparedness Day Tragedy

PORTLAND, Sept. 21 (AP)—The Oregonian tomorrow will carry a signed affidavit by Paul M. Callitoe, well known local politician, in which he declares his belief that he was the man who placed the suitcase bomb in the Frazer street.

Callitoe was placed in the exact spot where the explosion occurred at 10:05 A. M. on Sept. 21, 1916, which was the day of the Preparedness day.

Question in Series

The Oregonian said Callitoe was asked why he had not made his statement sooner, and was quoted as replying: "I was waiting for the right time to give the reasons that his statement, then living, were devoutly expected to be made."

Callitoe said he did not see the explosion, the Oregonian stated, and he was not present at the spot where the explosion occurred and another put in the following explanation: "I was in the city at the time, but I did not know his participation, though he knew he was innocent of any criminal activity."

THE TARIFF IN IDAHO: A great deal has been said, and the tariff in Idaho is a subject of much interest.

In considering these assertions, it will be well to keep a few essential facts in mind.

It is to be noted that more than ninety per cent of the increases contained in the present tariff laws are increases on products and raw materials which are produced in Idaho.

This fact alone is sufficient to explain the opposition on the part of Idahoans to the tariff.

Exports all over the world declined in 1931. In our country the percentage of decline was 47; in Canada 45 and in the Argentine, 53.

In 1931 few imports into the United States declined 81.7 per cent. In 1932 the decline was 84 per cent.

But, in 1931 we took 10 per cent of all the world's imports while under the Democratic Underwood tariff we took only 8.4 per cent of the total.

It is interesting, too, to observe that under the present tariff last year two-thirds of all the imports brought into this country, came in free of duty.

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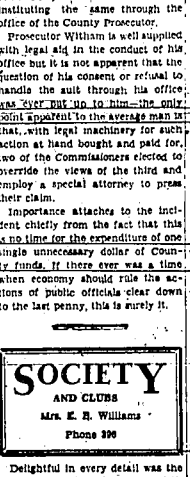

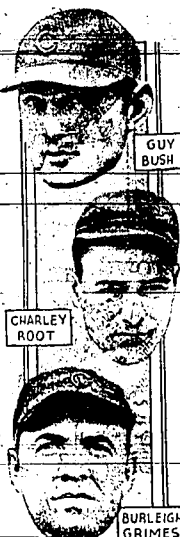
