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ROOSEVELT SHARES SPEAKING PLATFORM WITH G. W. NORRIS

Nebraska Senator and Democratic Candidate Call On Republicans to Put Country's Interests First

By W. O. HARRINGTON (Associated Press Staff Writer) Lincoln, Neb., Sept. 28.—

Mr. Roosevelt and Mr. Norris, speaking from the same platform today, called upon Republicans to put the interests of the country above those of party.

The veteran Republican Independent, vigorously told several thousand of the Nebraskans who he represented as senators in the White House.

They spoke from a platform in the county fair grounds at the senator's home while Governor Charles W. Bryan, brother of the late William Bryan, and himself once a vice-presidential nominee, sat close by.

Mr. Roosevelt said of Norris that "whether we agree with him on all the little details, or not, he stands for a very perfect, genuine knight of American progressive ideas."

Norris in introducing Mr. Roosevelt said that he was a patriot and demanded that the interests of the country be put above those of party.

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Appendix to Youth The New York governor said the whole nation gave full recognition to the integrity, unswerving courage and high character of Norris.

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# GOVERNOR TELLS PLAN TO FINANCE RELIEF PROGRAM

## Executive Declares Purpose To Use Federal Funds for Employment in Crop Salvage in Twin Falls Area

Governor C. Don Ross outlined here today a plan for the expenditure of federal government relief funds in Twin Falls county through a local organization, comparable to the Twin Falls Associated Farmers. The plan, which, he said, is to be presented at a meeting of interested persons here this afternoon, contemplates employment of destitute persons in harvesting and storage of this district's products for use in meeting relief requirements.

The meeting to which the governor referred is one that had been arranged to be held on the Parish hall at 8 P. M. This evening, to receive the report of a committee headed by C. K. Hunt, Twin Falls, that was named last week to investigate the proposition of setting up a Farmer-Labor Exchange in Twin Falls county.

"We are going to take care of Twin Falls county," the governor said in the statement he gave out here last evening at the same time cautioning The News representative to get this straight.

"We want to organize the work through a local organization, which will be representative of various civic and fraternal organizations and churches, like your Associated-Guilds."

"A meeting, I am told, is to be held here to consider local relief problems. I shall have a representative there to outline the plan we have worked out and to ask for the appointment of a committee to see me here as all come in."

"Our object is to get this committee to work as soon as possible. The reason is that we want to establish a commissary here and fill it with good things that the Twin Falls county products to eat."

"Then we have got to find out how many families are going to need help so we can tell how many to provide for."

"We desire to create as much labor as possible rather than to establish a dole."

In addition to harvesting and storage of products, the governor suggested establishment of a wood yard here where destitute men would be hired to work for "a reasonable wage."

"I would like to see four or five trainloads of logs brought here for the purpose of burning them. They are getting train-loads of logs at Boise, and I am going to pay the freight. Boise people are going to raise \$20,000 for relief purposes this season, and they will reimburse me out of that fund."

"Everybody has got to help, and our motto should be to make it do the work of 8."

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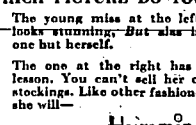

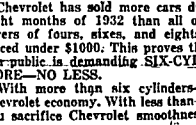
