



MISCONDUCT HALTS TRIAL OF SENATOR

Federal Judge Investigates Juror's Actions and Announced Need of Re-trial

NEW YORK, Oct. 3 (AP)—Misconduct on the part of a juror brought Senator James J. Davis' trial to a halt today. The juror, who had been summoned to Pennsylvania to campaign for re-election with the senator, was found to have violated the law by leaving the jury room to go to a hotel.

The re-trial probably will not be held until next week. Federal Judge Frank J. Coleman declared a mistrial when Charles J. Davis, the juror, was disclosed that Henry J. Moore, juror number 7, had complained to him that the juror was discussing remarks about the defense witness.

The juror, Abe H. Weintraub, an alternate, was excused by the judge after a brief hearing in the courtroom and a mistrial was ordered for further examination. Charles J. Davis said he would interfere in his behalf.

The mistrial came on the eleventh day of the trial as the defense nears the close of its efforts to show that Senator Davis had no knowledge of the state department in connection with the 1929 and 1931 charity balls of the Loyal Orange society, which were directed by general and Philip Morgan.

Judge Coleman opened court this morning with the announcement that a matter brought to his attention by counsel for the defense, that a juror had been seen in connection with a matter of which the defense had knowledge.

# PRIEST ASKS ALL TO PRAY TO GOD FOR GOOD TIMES

## Assistant Pastor of St. Edwards' Catholic Church Recommends Supplication For Country and World

Taking for his text "The Kingdom of Heaven Suffereth Violence and the Violence Shall Be Taken," and for his subject "Supplication for Better Conditions," Rev. H. L. Herrmann, assistant pastor of St. Edwards' Catholic church in his Sunday morning sermon urged all to comply with the request of blessed Joseph daily of the rosary daily during the month of October, either at early mass or at home for better moral and financial conditions in this country and in the world.

"In substance and in part, Rev. # American League Teams Prepare to Strengthen Cohorts

## White Sox Club Appropriates Big Sum to Gain Ends

### Athletes, Cleveland and Washington Prepare to Go Far in Building Nines to Overcome Losses

NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—It is being demonstrated in three conclusive, sanguinary engagements that the National league baseball forces have no viable means of stopping the Yankees, the main task of doing something about this menace for 1933 now appears to devolve upon the American league rivals of the world champions.

Led by the Chicago White Sox, who presumably have opened up the war chest and thrown the key away, the magnates will spend at least a half million dollars to make the next American league tighter and tougher for the Yankees.

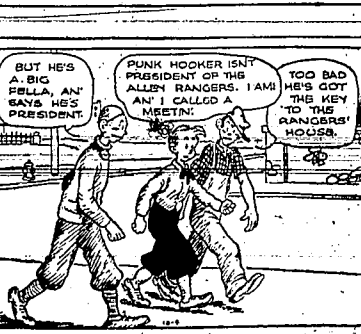

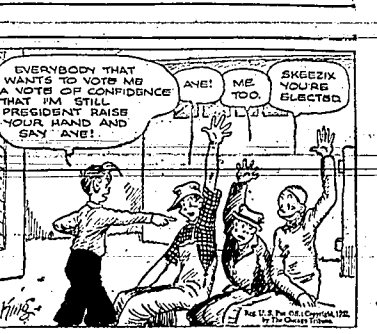

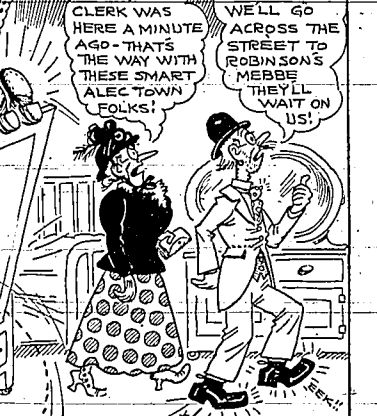
