PEAK OF BUILDING PERIOD NEARS FOR GIGANTIC PROJECT

EXCAVATION FOR DAM ITSELF BEGINS SOON

Work Also Progresses on Two Great Spillways in Nevada and Arizona Districts

(By The Associated Press) BOULDER CITY, Nev., Oct. 11.—Two feet were cranked into the Hoover dam project a year ahead of schedule...

The peak construction period is nearing with the advent of cooler weather. The total employed to 4000 will be put on the job. This period of highest activity is expected to last about a year.

Already Frank T. Crowe, Boise, contractor, has started the work on the dam. The dam will be diverted through the two tunnels soon.

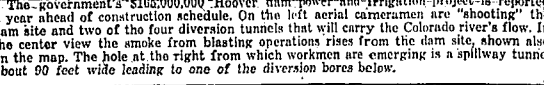

The hole at the right from which workmen are emerging is a spillway tunnel about 90 feet wide leading to one of the diversion bays below.

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DEFENBACH ARGUES OVER STATE CARS

Republican Candidate Also Reiterates Intention of Cutting State Expenses

RIDGELY, Oct. 11.—Battle over the number of state-owned automobiles was continued here this evening by Byron DeBach, Republican nominee for governor in an address which dealt with proposed economic and reduction of taxation.

"A prominent Democratic speaker says I am a damn liar," DeBach declared. (Governor C. Ben Ross had used the expression in referring to the number of cars his administration has bought.)

"Now it is difficult to conceive of any man who would not do so because they are afraid they cannot collect. If this process continues, the country will be ruined."

"I thought I am talking as my subject, 'Taxa Versus Expenses.' What we are promising is a reduction of taxes and a reduction of expenses of the state government. I am told that Democrats ridicule that promise as impossible."

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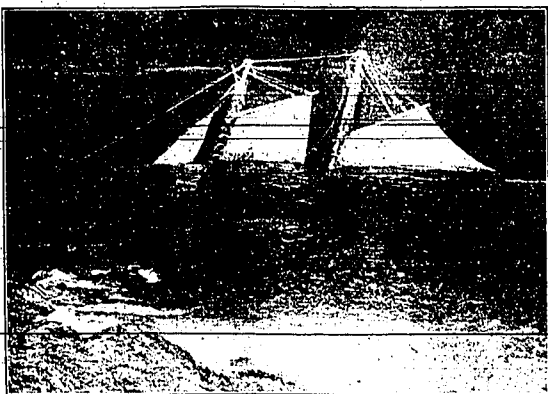

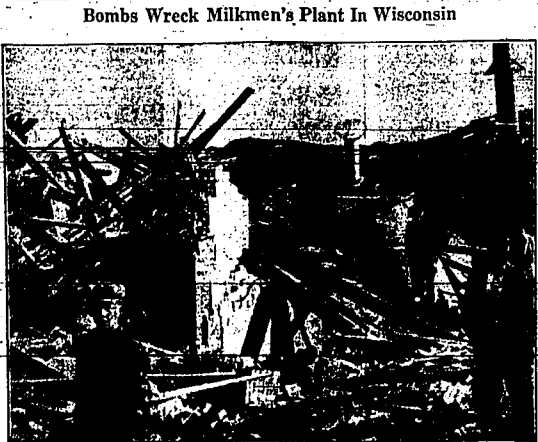

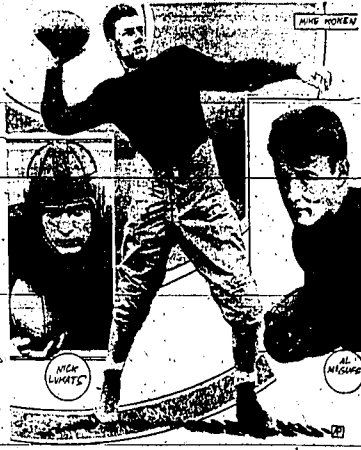

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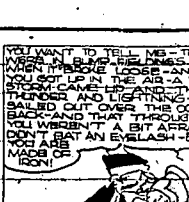
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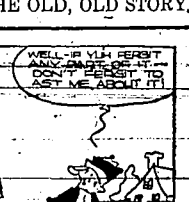
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IDAHO RECLAMATION COMMITTEE FAVORS RESERVOIR PROJECT

State-Wide Congress of Irrigators Approves Applications for Loans for Increasing Water Supply

An all-Idaho reclamation committee has recommended expenditure of more than \$2,000,000 of Reconstruction Finance corporation funds in construction of reservoirs in upper Snake river region, members of the Twin Falls delegation reported on their return yesterday from the session which was held Monday at Idaho Falls.

Proposed reservoirs in the Conant and Swan Valley districts on the South fork of Snake river would meet requirements for flood control and to permit transfer of water from fall and winter months to the proposed new reservoirs, thereby relieving the American Falls district of wintering drafts of 800,000 acre feet annually for power development purposes and make certain of its full capacity every year.

"Such a development," Judge J. B. Rothwell, member of the Twin Falls delegation and who has solved Snake river water problems.

The proposed Grand Teton reservoir would provide a supplemental water supply for 100,000 acres in the upper Snake river area.

The committee also endorsed applications for \$300,000 loan for construction of a reservoir at the lower waters of the Payette river, and for \$250,000 to construct a pumping power plant on the Snake river, and for \$100,000 for supplemental water supplies in the Payette and the Grand and Indian Gorge districts, in Adams and Cassia counties.

The committee took under advisement applications by Henry's Lake reservoir district, the Bear River and the Lost River project for loans to retire outstanding bond issues, and in the case of the Lost River to purchase also an interest in the construction company.

Up To Engineers Applications which received the committee's endorsement are subject to further investigation by the state and federal reclamation departments and to report on engineering feasibility. The committee's endorsement carries approval from the viewpoint of economic necessity and ability to pay out.

The committee was advised by its chairman, John W. Hart, Hilly, who recently had made two trips to Washington for conferences with the federal reclamation department and the Reconstruction corporation, that loans are to be granted to self-liquidating projects that will provide employment and that are shown to be feasible and necessary for flood control or for providing supplemental irrigation water supplies for lands already under irrigation.

The state-wide reclamation committee, following representation by all Idaho irrigated areas, was formed in pursuance of a suggestion given by the federal reclamation director of reclamation on a visit to Idaho last August 1. The governor and state commissioner of reclamation are ex-officio members of the committee. Twin Falls delegation at Monday's meeting was composed of N. V. Blinn, director; John W. Iron, manager, and Judge J. B. Rothwell, attorney for the Twin Falls Canal company.

Conant and Swan Valley reservoir projects on the South fork of Snake river were urged at the Idaho Falls meeting by R. E. Blumhagen, secretary, M. B. Yeaman, Idaho Falls, and W. O. Cotton, Idaho Falls.

Irrigated districts from Ashton on the north to Welter, Payette and Boise on the southwest were represented.

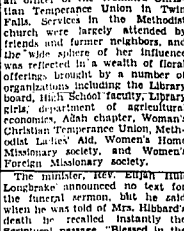
