Government's Newest Machinery Goes Into Action To Aid Citizens

CHICAGO, Oct. 14 (AP)—Detectives today arrested nine men, including a lawyer, a broker, an insurance man, and an office manager, and declared that they had brought up a widespread plot to dispose of counterfeit securities with an aggregate face value of more than \$100,000.

A package containing \$100,000 in forged notes of the Consolidated Bank of Chicago was seized in a safety deposit vault, detectives said, soon after it had been placed there by the nine men.

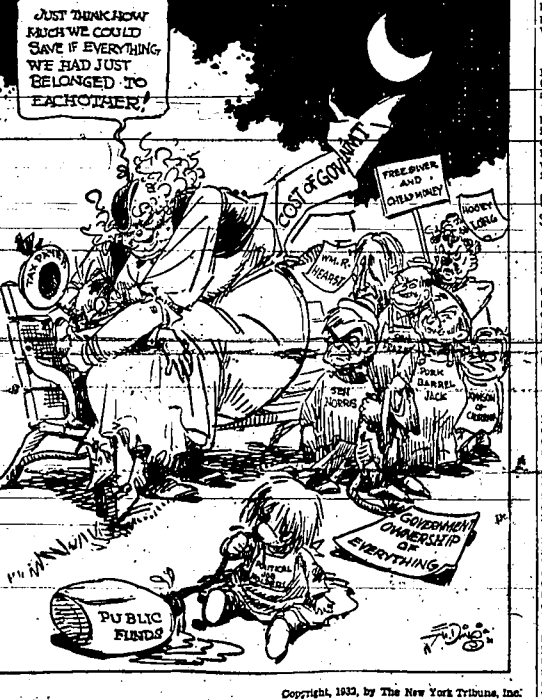
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JOHN W. GARNER REPLIES TO FOE IN RADIO SPEECH

Texan Declares Confidence in Credit Structure—One of Most Useful Things To Restore Better Times

(By The Associated Press.) NEW YORK, Oct. 14.—Replying to Republican attacks, Speaker John W. Garner tonight charged the House minority with concealing the true financial condition of the country during a "black-and-white" radio address.

"I am at this moment every element to promote prosperity except one," the Democratic vice-president said in a 15-minute radio address.

"That one thing is confidence in our credit structure. To my mind the most useful thing is to get our financial house in order. I want to see our budget balanced by careful control of our expenditures."

"I know I have been represented in certain partisan arguments as a dangerous radical, either without the disposition to understand public questions or with a selfish desire to turn things topsy-turvy with some wild idea of my own."

"The speaker professed his discussion of the budget by saying: 'Let me take up perhaps the most alarming declaration that was ever made by any man in the history of the world...'

"The speaker said that the Republican program is a 'policy of reckless extravagance' and that the Democratic program is a 'policy of sane economy'."

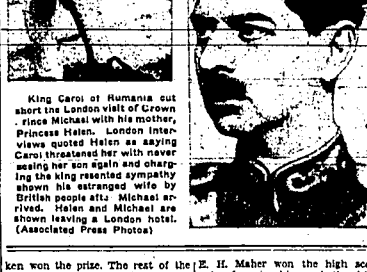
