would have been for the current year a further saving of at least half a billion more.

The president asserted that Roosevelt, in his statement that expenditures had increased by \$1,000,000,000 between 1917 and 1931, had failed to mention that the increase was almost wholly for relief of the depression.

The president said if Hoover had chosen for his comparison of fiscal totals not the year 1927, but 1928, in which he added, you can be sure there was no waste under President Coolidge.

Listing the state of each of his recommendations, Hoover said to the need of obliterating expenditures and securing more revenue, the president's program actually would have passed measures which would have cost the government billions of dollars in expenditures.

"If there is a deficit this year," Hoover said, "it will be due to the Democratic members of congress. We had a vast amount of critics from the Democratic side on the subject of economy during the whole session. This category, instead of the facts, seems to have lodged in the mind of the Democratic candidate."

Roosevelt himself, the president continued, has entered "a labyrinth of inaccurate statements." In speaking Secretary Hill estimates that the future revenues, The Democratic nominee, he said, would "appear to expect that by capital gains and the new petroleum," revenues could be properly predicted "in the midst of the greatest crisis in history."

The governor-implicor, he said, "that as the result of failure to read the crystal of the future we have jeopardized the credit of the federal government. The answer is that the government does not know that only 10 days ago the treasury sold \$300,000,000 of notes at 3 per cent interest. That does not look like a discredited institution. There is no government in the world financing such a confidence in its stability."

The governor's labored charge that for some similar purpose the facts were misrepresented or concealed from the people is 600-610 to every \$100 of actual federal expenditures and receipts are landed to the public every day in the year in the "black ink of the morning."

Furnish next to the 19 recommendations he had made to congress for relief and economic rehabilitation the president listed among them increase in the capitalization of the federal land banks by \$125,000,000 (creation of the reserve authority of the federal reserve board to "meet the danger to the home loan discount banks, and relief for depositors in closed banks).

He listed also revision of the banking laws, allocation of \$300,000,000 to the Reconstruction Finance corporation for relief of distress, creation of a new system of agricultural credit banks, aid to the movement of agricultural commodities, maintenance of the restriction on immigration, modification of private relief and "the world economic conference."

Other measures, Mr. Hoover said, will be proposed to the next congress "especially for further relief of farm mortgages." The chief executive said the program he outlined was "wrought against the heart-breaking obstructions and delays of the Democratic house."
