### CALLAHAN DISCUSSES POLITICAL MATTERS

#### Senator at Cottonwood Says Governor Ross Did Duty in State Highway Case

COTTONWOOD, Idaho, Oct. 24 (AP)—Recommendation that Governor Ross prosecute the highway case to which he referred in his description of the Gutzman case was made tonight by Donald A. Callahan, Republican state senator from Shoshone county and chairman of the Senate Finance Committee. "It is a trail leading to higher-ups," he said, "it should be followed up and should get some results. If there is no trail the governor is doing a great wrong to the people."

He said the governor had three ways of reducing the appropriations, first by consulting the printing and appropriation bills and asking that they be reduced, or second by cutting items in the bills, or by reducing the appropriations through agreement with the board of examiners and the budget directors. "The fact that he chose none of these remedies," he said, "is a serious fault in his later date from going up and down the state blaming others for excessive appropriations."

### SHORT LINE RAILROAD FILES TWO PETITIONS

HOIE, Oct. 24 (AP)—Oregon Short Line Railroad company filed two petitions in state court today, one an appeal from a decision of the public utilities commission and a second for a rehearing on the decision of the court last week. The commission's decision was in favor of the Idaho county commissioners who were opposed in attaching unimproved territory to the short line for public utility purposes. The railroad company contended there were no benefits in the petition for attachment of the territory and, moreover, there was no justification for attaching the territory, through which runs several miles of the company's railroad, subject to taxation. The territory is unimproved, the railroad contended, and the attachment is for the sole purpose of taxing the property of the railroad company.

### IDAHO FALLS SHERIFF SEARCHES FOR YOUTH

IDAHO FALLS, Idaho, Oct. 24 (AP)—A searching party, headed by Sheriff William Garstch, will leave tomorrow morning for the Bear river country approximately 80 miles northwest of here to hunt for Dean Dietrich, 19-year-old Boise banker's assistant who has been missing in the hills since Saturday morning. The youth left Boise Saturday morning with three companions to hunt in the Beaver creek country 20 miles east of here. He was lost when the party split up to hunt in different directions. Rangers of the Boise national forest and companions of the youth searched for him Sunday and today without success. A search party of 15 men, 12 inches of snow upon the ground struck in the mountains Saturday afternoon after the lead was lost. It was believed that this caused him to lose the trail back to camp.

### SNOWSTORM VISITS REGION OF ROCKIES

#### Five-Inch Blanket Covers Denver as Winter Plays Opening-1932 Engagement

DENVER, Oct. 24 (AP)—Western states felt the first real winter of the 1932 season with 5 inches of snow in Denver and varying from the eastern slopes of the Rocky mountains to the Kansas line. The western slope of the Rockies was cloudy-but snowless and New Mexico was warm and sunny. Heavy snow at Denver clung to trees and shrubs, breaking many and melted into a soft slush which impeded traffic considerably. Temperatures were mild. At Colorado Springs 2 inches of snow covered the ground and 4 inches was measured on Pike's peak. Pueblo received the season's first snowfall which melted quickly and Trinidad received none at all.

A bath wind that at times reached 50 miles per hour hurried the storm clouds over southeastern Wyoming Sunday and Monday, and snow fell over most of the area. Laramie, Cheyenne, and Lincoln all reported snow. At Cheyenne it amounted to only 1/2 of an inch with about the same precipitation at Yellowstone where it was 1/2 degree above zero. It was around 25 degrees in Cheyenne.

The snowstorm hovered over the Big Horn mountain country, where three Wyoming hunters are lost and threatened to spin close highways which had just been opened after last week's storm. Forest rangers and game officials, while continuing their search for the missing men, warned incoming hunters that roads might be closed for the season at any moment. Heavy clouds in the mountains were quickly filling the recently cleared roads with snow, they warned.

Northwestern Montana was clear but the rest of the state was under clouds with light precipitation reported in the eastern half. Temperatures were generally below freezing. Generally fair weather was predicted for Tuesday in Colorado, New Mexico, Wyoming and Montana.

APOSTLE DELIVERS TALK HERE UPON RELIGIOUS VIEW

Elder Stephen L. Richards Explains Principles of Philosophy of Church of Latter-Day Saints

Elder Stephen L. Richards, apostle of the Church of Jesus Christ, of the Latter-Day Saints, delivered a sermon on the philosophy of the church at the morning meeting of the church conference of the Twin Falls stake Sunday.

In part he said: "Many people have the wrong conception of what the Mormon philosophy of life really is. We do not believe that man was made for the church but rather that the church was made for the man. Man is that he might have joy. The glory of God is to bring to pass the immortality of man. This is a familiar passage to our people: 'Who are thou man that God needs be mindful of thee? Man is the offspring of Deity, he has the attributes of his heavenly Father—possesses the natural that man shall aspire to high and noble things. We have in this church the highest power ever delegated to man, that power is the priesthood, our Christian brethren have the wrong conception of the priesthood; they think the word means suppression of individuality or the right to perpetrate atrocious crimes. The priesthood is the authority God delegated to man to act and officiate in His sacred rites in this mortal sphere. It gives to man the right to preach the gospel, to baptize the faithful, to call to the witness stand the wayward and to baptize the repentant. It is the authority which the priesthood upon worthy male members and before the Holy Ghost, that directs our footsteps back to the throne of our Father, Joseph Smith, which then corrects principles and govern themselves. There is many offices in the priesthood, viz: High Priest, Bishop, Elder, Priest, Deacon, Teacher, Priesthood, those belong to the lesser or Aaron order. The Melchizedek order embraces the Elder, Seventy, and High Priest. This order is patterned after the true order of God, and is the highest power or influence can or ought to be maintained by virtue of the priesthood, by gentleness and meekness, and by love unfeigned, by kindness, and pure knowledge, which shall greatly enlarge the soul without hypocrisy, and without guile—let thy joy be made full of charity towards all men, and to the household of faith, and let virtue garnish thy thoughts unceasingly; then shall thy confidence wax strong in the presence of God, and the doctrine of the Priesthood shall dwell upon thy soul as the dew from heaven. The Holy Ghost shall be thy constant companion, and thy scepter and unchanging scepter, of righteousness and truth; and thy dominion shall be an everlasting dominion, and without compulsory means it shall flow unto thee for ever and ever."

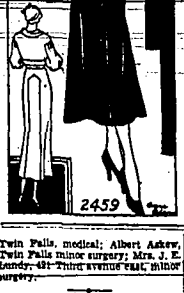

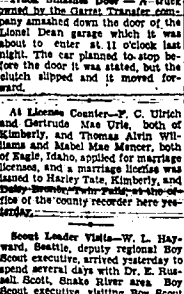

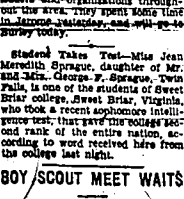
