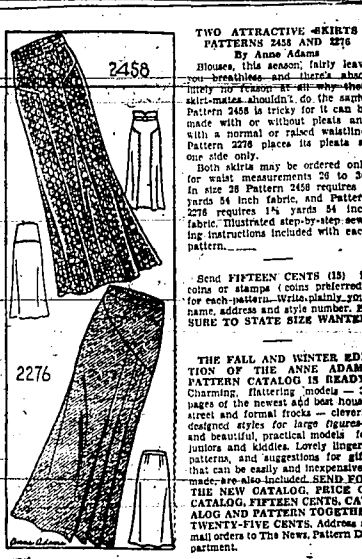

LINDGREN (Associated Press Staff Writer) PITTSBURGH, Oct. 26 (AP)—The Panthers of Pitt, on edge for their traditional grid classic with Notre Dame in the stadium Saturday, are telling themselves they have a better chance than ever before to win something they have never done—beat the Irish.

But they admit it's a tough assignment and they anticipate a busy Saturday afternoon. It was 23 years ago that the football students of Pitt and Notre Dame first met on the gridiron. The beat the Panthers ever have been able to do was hold the Hamblers to a 10-10 tie in 1911.

Rambler Wins in 1909 In 1909—the first year the teams met—Notre Dame won, 6 to 0. The Irish superb line plugging Maughan and Dimmick. Then came the deadlock of 1911. The next year, in a terrific struggle, Notre Dame won, 14 to 0. The Irish won their first game in 1912, 14 to 0, when the Irish again triumphed over Pittsburgh and went home with a 35-12 victory.

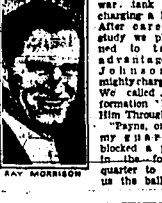

# Five Hogs To Each Farm Worth \$882,000 To Tract

## In terms of hogs, what would be a fair average-income per acre from the Twin Falls tract?

As youngsters we heard much regarding the "hog" as a "mortgage" since time has not destroyed the truth of that belief. Hogs have always been recognized as a production of the farm.

It may be of interest to note by the later comparison how a portion of the 60,000 hogs in the United States is distributed. For each 1000 population, Iowa has more than 3000 hogs; Nebraska, 2500; Kansas, 2000; Illinois, 1500; and Idaho, 500. However, only four and one-half per cent of the hogs in the United States are raised in the Intermountain and Pacific coast areas.

In order to indicate the value of the hog in American industry, we note in a census of industrial products where the automobile industry ranks at the top of the list in money value; next but slightly less in value comes the meat packing industry.

A most interesting local comparison between automobiles and hogs is to be found in some of our county schedules, where the number of hogs is totaled at less than 2500 and the automobiles exceed 7000.

The average farm unit on the Twin Falls tract comprises less than 80 acres.

However, on that basis there are more than 2000 such units and a number of these, hog production has been steadily maintained with satisfactory results. Hogs will cost all the interior products of the farm area of the tract.

Everything indicates that there will be a large attendance and a most profitable and enjoyable meeting.

Sectional meetings between the members of the regular program are expected to be of unusual educational interest, he said.

The Following Facts and Figures Are Submitted by George G. Barrett, Treasurer of the State of Idaho

### The General Fund--Deficit \$1,674,972

State operating expenses are paid out of the General Fund. There is a balance in the General Fund as of October 10, 1932, amounting to \$40,837.94. Warrants in the sum of \$215,809.94 are outstanding which cannot be paid by reason of lack of money in the General Fund. In addition, there are outstanding \$1,500,000 in General Fund Treasury Notes, also called Tax Anticipation Notes. The General Fund is in arrears, therefore, in the staggering sum of \$1,674,972.00.

### Balance In State Treasury

As stated above, only \$40,837.94 now in the State Treasury, is available to pay this vast indebtedness. It is true there is in the Treasury an additional sum of \$1,733,363.74, but this money belongs to the general fund and other special funds. These sacred funds cannot be used to pay operating expenses of the State.

### The Highway Fund

On September 30, 1932, showed a balance of only \$3,560.80, with great numbers of outstanding unpaid bills and unpaid estimates in an amount known only to the Highway Department.

### The Fish and Game Fund

On October 19, 1932, was \$1,282.67, which is subject to a reduction of \$6000 to be paid to the predatory animal fund, as compared with \$106,362.04 at the beginning of the administration.

### Executive Appropriations for 1931-32

These appropriations exceeded by \$51,046.78 the appropriations of 1930-31. The amount actually appropriated was \$76,002.11 less than the amount asked by the Governor of the Legislature.

### Insurance Fund Reserves are rapidly decreasing; the Game Funds are almost gone; the general Funds are in arrears—\$1,674,972.00. Miscellaneous receipts have greatly declined. Taxes will go delinquent this year in unheard-of amounts.
