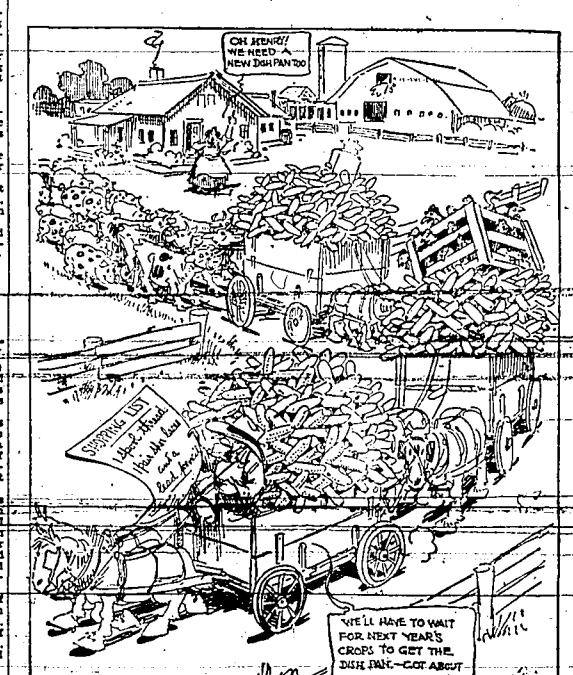
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DEFENBACH SPEAKS IN MOUNTAIN HOME

Republican Candidate Promises to Formulate Tax Revision Plan for Idaho

MOUNTAIN HOME, Oct. 27 (Special to The News)—Declaring that while the first step to solve the state's present economic ills must be a reduction of the tax burden, Byron Defenbach, Republican candidate for governor, emphatically pledged himself to a thorough-going revision of our governmental revenue system.

"If the people of Idaho see fit to elect me governor, I will devote my entire time and effort during the remaining weeks of October and the month of December to the preparation of a tax revision program, which I will submit to the legislature at an early date as possible," the speaker said.

"The speaker described the kind of a system that he hoped could be put in effect in Idaho. "We need a well balanced, carefully planned tax system which will not only protect every individual and industry in our state, but will, on the other hand, make every cent of the tax revenue bear its just share of the tax burden," he said.

Defenbach favors tax legislation which will definitely limit the amount of direct taxes that can be levied against any given piece of real estate.

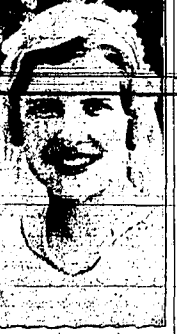

POPE TELLS VIEWS ON NATION'S NEEDS

Candidate for United States Senate Aims Shaft at Idaho's Voting Record

James P. Pope, Boise, Democratic candidate for United States senator, addressed a audience of nearly 100 persons in the Legion Memorial building here last night, attributing the depression to "broken promises" and "bungling leadership of the Republican administration," and promising that when in office he would bring about a change in the interests of the common people, during the next four years, Idaho will have two votes in the senate, which it has not had the past four years.

A motor truck illuminated by red flares, in which members of Twin Falls heard ranted through the business district for an hour before the meeting opened, was led by Mr. Pope spoke for an hour and a half. The address was not broadcast.

Democratic candidates for legislative and county offices were introduced by Dan J. Lavancher, city clerk and Democratic national candidate, who carried this county by 2000 to 10000 votes, and he had received advice from other sections of Idaho indicating 20,000 to 35,000 plurality in this state for Democratic candidates.

Declaring the present crisis is "more serious than has followed during the World war," Mr. Pope asserted the people of Idaho are determined to make a change in their affairs and will no longer express themselves at the polls in November.

Criticized Republicans. The Republican administration, he said, has failed to fulfill promises of four years ago to continue prosperity and to furnish farm relief.

"Prosperity," he said, "should be a political issue in any campaign, but not the function of government by fiat or otherwise to give property to some, and no party in power has the right to promise prosperity in any other way than through honest, economical administration of the law, hearing equally upon all sides."

The candidate referred to the "infamous, indigestible Grand tariff" and quoted Senator Borah to the effect that this measure would "bring on the farmer the whole burden of the protective tariff system."

Four nations, he said, had adopted retaliatory measures against the tariff on American industry and agriculture.

"Economic duties granted on manufactured articles in the East," he said, "disturbed and shut off the markets for agricultural products, and our Tariff trade fell from \$5,000,000,000 to \$2,000,000,000."

"At this particular time," he continued, "it is not talking about tariff policies, but Franklin D. Roosevelt, it seems to me, has worked out a sound policy whereby representatives of all the nations will work out a reciprocal tariff measure."

Impetuous Many Animals. Ana Candler, Jr., brought the animals from remote sections of the world last spring. There has been much activity on the Candler property since, preparing comfortable and healthful quarters for the animals. Lion, tiger, proper swimming facilities for the swans and other water birds. All was going well, Mr. Candler was preparing to hold open house so that all Atlanta could visit his zoo, his remarkable collection of wild beasts for the benefit of a crippled children's home.

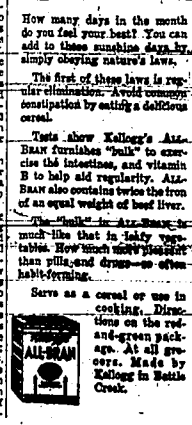

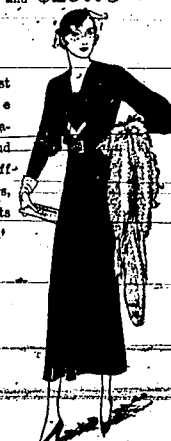
