includes international control of armaments, the right to investigate the armaments of each nation, or gamification of mutual assistance, and obligatory arbitration.

1. Any formation contrary to such organization of any army or navy would be prohibited.

2. International control of armaments would be granted, with provision for the right to investigation.

3. The Locarno pact would be completed by similar pacts with assistance so that every European nation would participate and the collective force would be sufficient to repress aggression.

4. The United States would accord those guarantees of security it had previously offered.

5. States that are members of the League of Nations would engage to fulfill all obligations under article 16 of the league covenant.

6. Arbitration would be obligatory for all states adhering to the new pact.

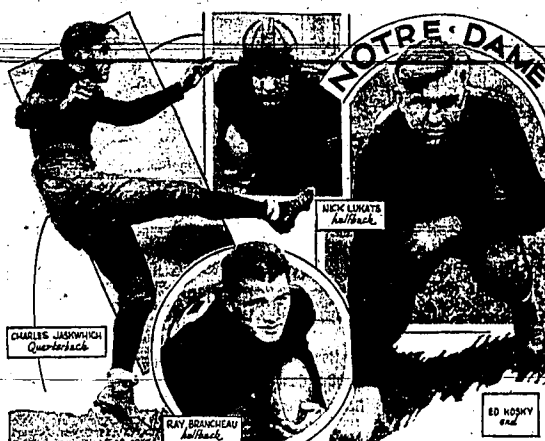

LAWYER REVIEWS FORGOTTEN LAWS

Hollister Audience Hears Attorney in Outline of Commissioners Record

HOLLISTER, Oct. 28 (Special to The News)—A two-weeks-extended joint report of Twin Falls county's record before the auditor which was made public yesterday, shows that the county has an available cash and bank total of \$14,000 less than enough to pay common school district funds which will be in trust for three districts.

Other speakers were R. K. Dillingham, Frank H. Hollister, and J. L. Hodgin, Twin Falls attorney and former state representative. W. P. Klumwetter, Hollister Republican committee chairman, introduced P. C. Smeberger, Twin Falls, Republican county chairman, who presided.

Mr. Dillingham reviewed his legislative program with emphasis particularly upon a demand for "less miles and more work on state highways."

Mr. Hodgin compared records in governmental economy to show that the national administration under President Hoover since 1929 had reduced regular operating expenses of the national government by \$1,400,000,000 at the same time reduced the national debt from \$20,000,000,000 to \$16,000,000,000.

Reviewing President Hoover's administration from the industrial conference in New York to the German debt moratorium and establishment of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, Mr. Hodgin declared that about the only credit the farmers had last spring came through the Reconstruction Finance Corporation which directly or through banks.
