BUDGET SAVINGS LEAVES COUNCIL WITH QUESTION

Twin Falls City Administration Considers Further Retrenchment to Bring Costs Within Revenue

With unexpected annual budget appropriations well above the half-year mark at the close of the first six months of Twin Falls City's fiscal year, members of the city council at a regular meeting last evening questioned whether it might not be necessary to make further retrenchments in order to bring the year's expenditures within limits of actually collected revenue.

"The only question," Mayor R. E. Bohrer said, "whether the people are willing to be taxed the taxes it looks to me to pay the way we were going to have to cut city services. We are up on a rock bottom basis yet."

The city clerk, G. M. Hall, submitted to the council a statement showing expenditures during the first half of the year, totaling \$47,001.72 for the year, leaving \$5,781.28 balance of unexpended budget appropriation for the remaining six months of the fiscal year.

The city treasurer, C. M. McManus, reported approximately \$10,000 cash in all funds at the end of October. This sum, with \$2000 anticipated water rates due during November, will be available for redemption of bonds and interest totaling approximately \$12,000, he said, December 1, according to the council's calculations.

The clerk's report showed warrants issued during October in the sum of \$11,885 against the general fund, \$434 against street sprinkling, \$1,450 for two months of the public library, and \$1860 payment of two months' bill for street lighting.

Council was encouraged by report of \$330 collection of 1932 taxes during the month of October.

(Gas and Oil Bill)

It cost the city \$277 for gas and oil during October—according to a report laid before the council last evening. The several departments of the city administration using automotive equipment consumed during the month 1100 gallons of gasoline and 10 gallons of oil, the report showed. Street sprinkling consumed 200 gallons of gasoline and 1 1/2 gallons of oil; street department, 510 gallons of gasoline and 1 1/2 gallons of oil; mail and dairy inspection, 71 gallons of gasoline and 1 1/2 gallons of oil; waterworks department, 100 gallons of gasoline and 6 1/2 gallons of oil; fire department, 50 gallons of gasoline and 2 gallons of oil; police department, 185 gallons of gasoline and 11 gallons of oil.

The automobile was stolen in Twin Falls during October, and none was recovered, according to the police department's monthly report. The stolen vehicle was last evening. One bicycle was reported stolen, and two bicycles were recovered during the month. Arrests made by police officers during October numbered 30, of which 19 were on account of minor ordinances, on account of violation of traffic regulations, 4 on account of drunkenness, and 7 on account of failure to furnish surety law. Officers issued 29 warnings for minor violations of traffic rules, and 50 for other minor violations of various other ordinances, and investigated 24 complaints of various kinds.

The police sergeant, J. W. Bouton, reported 185 fines and costs collected during the month, costs assessed during the month.

Death Summons JOHN H. DETWEILER

Former Twin Falls Realtor And Contact Rancher Loses Desperate Struggle

John H. Detweiler, who was for years engaged in the real estate business in Twin Falls and since 1923 a resident of Contact, Nevada, where he had ranching interests, died in the county general hospital here shortly after 6 o'clock last evening, following more than two months' illness that degenerated into a determined effort to save his life.

Arrangements for funeral services had been completed in Twin Falls, though it was stated that Twin Falls' Masonic lodge, of which Mr. Detweiler was a member, would be requested to take charge. The body was taken to the Twin Falls mortuary.

BEET CROP BRINGS GENEROUS REWARD

Campaign at Factory Shows Yields and Sugar Content Exceeding Expectations

The 1932 campaign at the Amalgamated sugar company's Twin Falls plant, which was one-third of the way through Saturday when it ended its thirty-fifth day, is closing two things of major importance to sugar beet growers, who under this season's contract, share equally with the factory in the price paid for the sugar. A. R. Hagar, agriculturist for the Amalgamated company, said last evening.

One of these important developments is that the yield of beets is exceeding the anticipated tonnage by a considerable margin, and the other is that sugar content of the beets is running higher than the average.

No figures were given out at the Amalgamated plant here, but it was current talk among growers that the average yield of beets would come nearer 20 tons than the 16 tons per acre which the Amalgamated company's agricultural staff had estimated before the harvest began. Sugar content, according to preliminary statements, will exceed 18 per cent.

Harvest of the sugar beet crop in this district is approximately 85 per cent completed. Mr. Hagar said last evening.

He urged growers to keep beets in the best possible marketable condition by covering them with tops when pulled and left in the ground for a few days. "Freezing of beets, he said, causes loss both of tonnage and sugar content."

He urged growers also to follow beet digging with fall plowing wherever possible, in order to prepare the ground for early planting of the next season's crop. Tractors have been placed in operation for fall plowing in the Amalgamated company's plant here.

RECEIVER PAYS \$75,000 DIVIDEND

First National Bank Distributors Share Second Distribution of 12 Per Cent

A second dividend of 12 per cent totaling \$75,000, is ready now for distribution among depositors with proved claims against the First National bank, Twin Falls, which closed last December 4. O. D. Thompson, receiver, announced last evening.

This dividend is being paid from funds acquired by the receiver in the ordinary course of liquidation, supplemented by a loan from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation.

"The first dividend of 18 per cent was paid last May."

The receiver's announcement of the second dividend payment said: "O. D. Thompson, receiver of the First National bank, Twin Falls, announces that a second dividend of 12 per cent, payable to all depositors who have proved claims, has been declared and he is now ready to deliver dividend checks to those depositors upon presenting their receiver's certificates in person or by mail at his office."

This dividend is being paid from funds acquired by the receiver in the ordinary course of liquidation, supplemented by a loan from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation. This loan, which is secured by a lien

on the remaining assets of the bank, may, of course, be retained, and until this loan is repaid, no further dividend distribution can be made to the receiver. It is believed that with the cooperation of the borrowers, this can be repaid without a reasonable time and so, the depositors will receive further regular dividend payments as the collections made by the receiver will warrant.

The funds of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation set aside for payment to receivers of insolvent banks are now being expended by the First National bank of Twin Falls. are fortunate to have an application for a loan accepted at this time. The funds released by this loan should be a material aid to the community in these difficult times.

The special attention of the depositors is directed to the fact that it is necessary for them to present their receiver's certificates for the payment before the checks can be delivered.

"As a matter of history, it is interesting to note that a straight-out Republican has never represented Idaho in the lower house of congress, largely because of the fact that the majority of the people in Idaho believe in the protective tariff policy of the Republican party."
