Roosevelt Triumphs In Democratic Avalanche

Ross, Pope And Coffin Now Down Opposition In Bourbon Landslide

With Little Variation Gem State Democracy Piles Up Overwhelming Margins In One of Heaviest Votes

(By The Associated Press) BOISE, (Wednesday Morning) Nov. 9.—Democratic returns from Idaho into almost certain control of Idaho in the wake of the Roosevelt landslide.

More than more than a third of the expected vote early today gave every Democratic candidate a lead in the 125 of the 116 precincts in the state, the reporting group of precincts including a large share of urban vote which reported early but a generous favoring of strictly rural expression.

The swing in Democratic control, continued into the remaining precincts, appeared almost certain to remove from Idaho the delegation to the national Republican convention, John Thomas, and its two Republican representatives, Burton A. Smith in the First district and Addison T. Smith in the Second district.

Two Mayors Win A change toward Democracy will put the mayors of Idaho's two largest cities in Congress. Mayor James P. Pope, Boise, in the Senate and Mayor T. C. Coffin, Pocatello, in the house of representatives.

Boise's Mayor Bests Thomas In the Democratic primary state officer, Governor C. Ben Ross, looked certain to draw around him a crowd of Democratic active officers instead of the Republicans, six in number, he has had for the past two years since he became the only Democrat to win in 1928.

Mayor Pope amassed 23,072 votes in the primary against 18,812 for Senator Thomas.

Repeals Wins T. C. Coffin, who campaigned largely on a demand for repeal of the Eighteenth amendment, received 11,117 for his Democratic opponent, Representative Smith, who announced he would continue to prohibit the sale of liquor to the people in a referendum but expressed himself as personally dry.

On the rest of the ticket, the same number of precincts, the vote for the Republican opponent, Byron Defenbach, was 18,812, against 23,072 for the Democratic candidate, Ross.

C. A. Bottorff, Arvo publisher and speaker of the press in the last year, trailed his Democratic opponent for lieutenant governor, George E. Hill, the vote being 14,690 for Hill and 11,117 for Bottorff.

ELECTORS IN MANY STATES VOTE FOR PROHIBITION FOES

Of 12 Senators Selected By Shortly After Midnight, Nine Stand Out For Change in Liquor Laws

HAROLD OLIVER (Associated Press Staff Writer) WASHINGTON, (Wednesday Morning) Nov. 9.—Candidates favoring repeal or modification of the Eighteenth amendment were shown to have been elected in large numbers on the basis of returns early today which also had piled up big initial majorities for anti-prohibition measures before the voters in 15 states.

Using answers to anti-prohibition organization questionnaires as a base, these returns showed that of 183 members elected to the new house, 103 either were for repeal or submission of a revised amendment, 7 were for prohibition and the views of 26 were not definitely known.

Nine Repeals Of the 12 senators definitely elected before 1:30 this morning, nine are for repeal, two are "dry," and the stand of the other had not been reported.

ROOSEVELT STAYS UP TILL MORNING Victor Goes Into Huddle With Managers After Reading Hoover's Message

BEAUMONT HOTEL, New York, (Wednesday Morning) Nov. 9 (AP)—While reporters continued to trickle into the room where he sat until long after midnight, Franklin D. Roosevelt early today withheld comment on the telegram from President Hoover congratulating him upon his election.

His conferences with his advisers and associates were held—James A. Farley, the chairman of the national committee, who had a short conference with him and several other members of the campaign were inside the room.

Outside the crowd scrambled for admittance only to be shoved back into the hall, and then by the policeman who had been stationed at the door.

A little earlier, shortly after his victory became apparent, the president-elect made two brief calls, thanking his friends and party workers for the efforts which he said had won a liberal victory.

Urges United Effort He urged that all join in working to bring a better day to America through the announcement of President Hoover's congratulatory telegram.

OHIO, REPUBLICAN FOR MANY YEARS, TURNS DEMOCRATIC

Midnight Hour Finds State, Known as "Mother of Presidents," Changing Allegiance Politically

(By The Associated Press) COLUMBUS, (Wednesday Morning) Nov. 9.—Ohio, "mother of presidents," until today staunchly Republican in all but one national election during the 72 years of the Republican party's existence, appeared definitely at midnight to have switched its 1932 allegiance to the Democratic standard from president-elect in down the line through the state ticket.

With less than ten per cent of a record breaking vote (tabulated) Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt had a 20,000 majority over President Hoover and was leading almost intact a state party ticket to what Ohio Republican newspapers and party leaders conceded was a Democratic victory.

With less than ten per cent of the record breaking vote from 1254 precincts out of 878 gave: Roosevelt 178,871; Hoover 166,210.

Major Candidates Win The Roosevelt sweep, carrying him to the White House as the third Democrat to win the office since the Civil War, carried to victory many a minor candidate for state and congressional offices in the 116 precincts of the principal Republican stronghold in the country.

Senator James Watson, Indiana, was one of those who the president-elect conceded defeat for the office of governor in the long before all the votes had been counted.

In New York state, the citadel toward which both parties directed their major attacks, such an advantage was given Roosevelt and controlled by the Democrats, who conceded they were defeated without waiting for a final compilation.

Republican newspapers in Chicago and New York gave up hope for the reelection of Hoover. So did Senator Hastings, Delaware, and Eastern Republican managers. The Democratic New York Times said that the "Roosevelt landslide" was "probably by a landslide."
