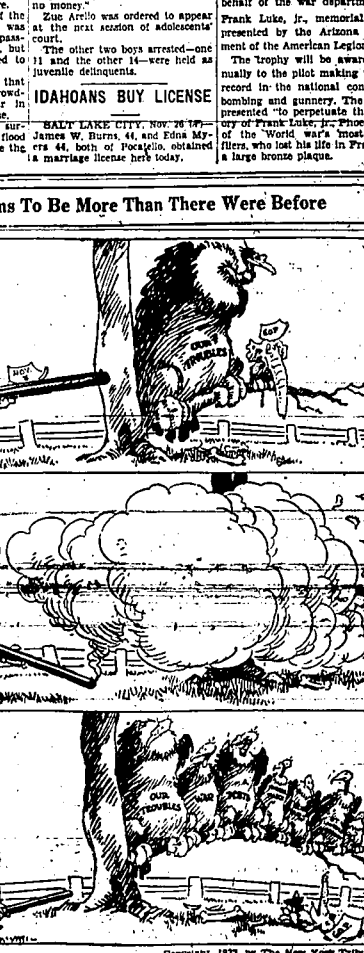

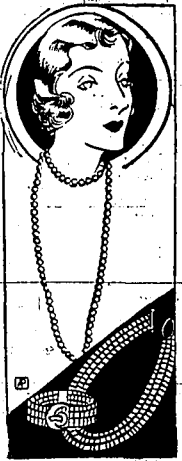

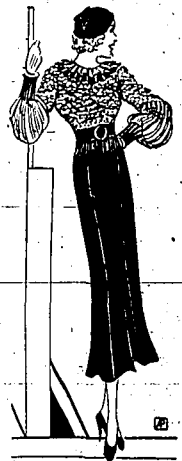

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WORK ON CANYON PROJECT ADVANCES

Present Development Permits Visualization of Pool and Park Completion

Four days work on a Twin Falls community swimming pool project, furnishing work relief for 11 men at Twin Falls, was completed during the past week. This has reached a stage where it is possible now to visualize the completed project, including diversion of water from a near-by drainage tunnel, and landscaping of the grounds in the vicinity of the pool and walls of Rock Creek canyon.

Workers using picks and shovels and a wheelbarrow, are employed in excavation of the pool. The pool will be 20 feet in diameter, and in bringing rock down from the canyon wall for framing the pool, one team of horses was used on the work yesterday, drawing a stone boat carrying rock from the canyon wall to the pool.

Work began on the swimming pool last Tuesday, as an emergency relief project, and will be continued until the project is completed or until weather conditions prevent. E. J. Fitch, chairman of Twin Falls Associated Charities, said last evening.
