PARRY ANNOUNCES COMMITTEE FOR ROCK CREEK PARK

Head of Chamber of Commerce Calls Meeting to Complete Plans for Project for Playground

Announcement of the personnel of the general committee to make a complete study of the proposed Rock creek park and driveway was made last night by R. P. Parry, president of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce, who at the same time issued a call for a meeting of the new committee Wednesday night at 7 o'clock at the headquarters of the Chamber of Commerce.

The following is the complete statement of President Parry: "The response to the first public announcement in the area recently as to possibilities of such an enterprise for this community has been general and in many quarters enthusiastic over the prospect.

"We are starting, therefore, with a general committee representing various organizations of this community, engineers and citizens at large so that there may be attained as possible understanding of all the facts and angles of the situation and outline of the general action taken while there is federal relief money available for general relief to construct the northern portion of the project this winter.

"The final plan in the end may require a number of years for completion. However, the necessity of providing the land in order to secure relief funds at once for winter employment offers this special opportunity to begin the construction work.

"As reviewed in the first announcement in the press last week the Rock Creek canyon offers for converting a worthless strip of land and dump-ground into a general park and playground.

R. D. Iverson, Taken In Missouri, Wanted Here for Blond Bandit Store Hold-Ups, Police Say

Richard D. Iverson, 29, Salt Lake City, reported in custody at Missoula, Mont., following attempted robbery of a restaurant there last November, was wanted here by the Twin Falls police. Iverson, a blond, Twin Falls police chief, said last evening.

The police chief said Iverson was issued here some days ago for Iverson's arrest on charge of robbery of a cashier of the J. C. Rooney company store here of \$200 the afternoon of September 21, and of robbery of the cashier of the J. C. Rooney store here last evening of October 22.

Descriptions given of the bandit in these robberies said he was a decided blond.

Wrecking Crews Tear Down "Gold Room" at Cheyenne

(By The Associated Press) CHEYENNE, Wyo., Nov. 28 (Special to The News)—The "Gold Room" soon will be merely a memory—and a haze one to the few who can look back 65 years. The rambling old frame structure known to present day Cheyenne only as 310 West sixteenth street has begun to fall under the blows of a wrecking crew, its history, crimson in its heyday, merely adding another bit of color to the glimmering Old West. Its title "Gold Room," those who recall will testify, was aptly placed.

During late years it was nothing more than a haven for discarded kitchen chairs and iron bedsteads, but 65 years ago it was known from coast to coast as "Jim Allen's Place." It was a welcome haven for the bull bachelors, the mule skinnors, the gamblers, and the "glided ladies" and within its four walls screamed the celebrants as the first Union Pacific passenger train steamed into Cheyenne, November 14, 1867.

Although the "Gold Room" lived up to its riotous name only for a few years, its bar, its gambling quarters, and its rambling stage, entertained such persons as John Bridges "Kid" Carson, "Wild Bill" Hickok, "Calamity" Jane, "Buffalo Bill" Cody, Wyatt Earp, "Bat" Masterson and George Frank Davis.

From 1867 until 1878 the "Gold Room" and Jim Allen flourished, but with the advent of the Black Hills gold rush its fame dwindled and soon it became a commercial structure. Now it finally is giving way for the march of progress and a new building.

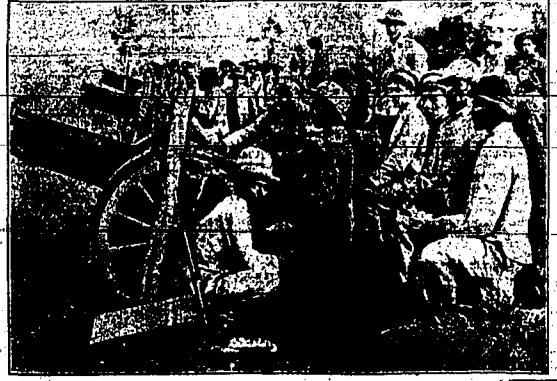

## Ramblers' Defeat Of Mighty Cadets Produces Thriller

Officials Expect Sell-Out Crowd of 100,000 Persons At Olympic Stadium to See Spectacular Battle

By ALAN GOULD (Associated Press Sports Editor) NEW YORK, Nov. 28.—As a result of what happened in the crucial football game of the Army right out in view of 80,000 cash and chilly spectators, it may be necessary to wait until the New Year to determine the so-called national intercollegiate champion of 1932.

The East has some startling football this year, including Army's victory over Harvard, Yale's scintillating 21-0 triumph over Brown and Pittsburgh's dazzling finish for a 12-0 victory over Cornell Saturday. The Rams are expected to represent the Far West again in the holiday intercollegiate classic at Pasadena on January 2. But they are listed meanwhile to entertain Notre Dame in the Olympic stadium, December 10, if the Southern Californians can win the green-jerseyed horde that overran Washington Saturday, they won't have to worry about any other brand of opposition.

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Customers expect their football appetites most of the season in order to buy tickets for the Army-Notre Dame battle contributed to a sell-out of the \$300,000, rivaled this year only by the receipts for the California-Berkeley game. The field is expected to touch the same figure with accommodations for 60,000 at prices of \$4.00 for reserved seats and \$2.00 for box seats.

## Death Claims 37 Lives on Nation's Grids During 1932

Despite Added Safeguards Grim Reaper Stalks Boldly Through Ranks of Athletes in America

(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, Nov. 28.—Despite added safeguards in the rules, death again took heavy toll of football players in the United States and territories during the season. A total of 37 died during a season, records today show the 37 succumbed to injuries.

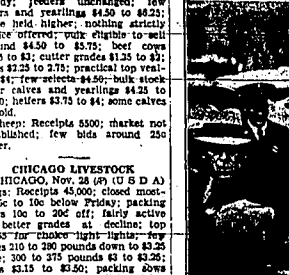

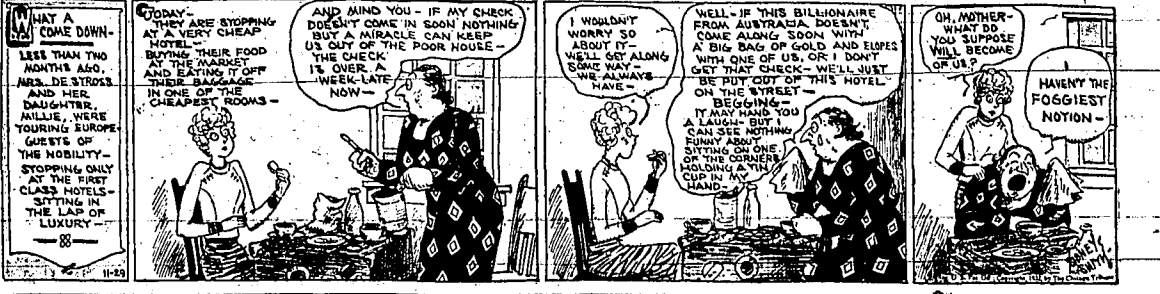

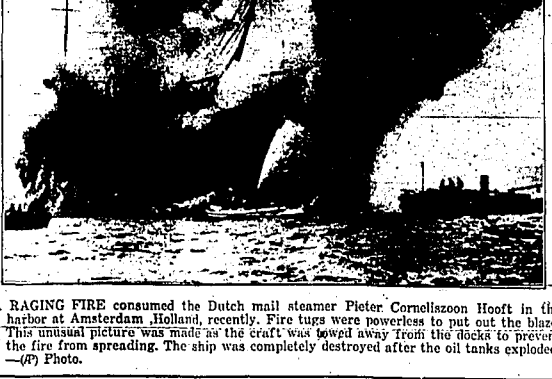
