Sarazen Reveals Golf Ambitions

American Champion Trains Sights on Overseas Stars After Best Year in Career

NEW YORK, Dec. 1 (AP) — Gene Sarazen, completing the greatest year of his extraordinary golfing career, has already begun a winter campaign looking toward an overseas invasion in defense of the British open championship. Sarazen's 1932 season, as revealed today through his business manager, Ray McCarthy, for the first time, contemplated leaving for England in April for a series of single matches with British rivals in advance of the open championship and Ryder cup matches.

The idea seems to be for Sarazen to "soften up" the opposition for his Ryder cup team-mates, who will be over on course for the two climax events of the spring campaign on British links. At the same time the British will have a good incentive to rally their defenses, with Sarazen as a spur and seek some revenge for humiliating they took from the American homebred professional team at Solihull in 1931.

Sarazen and McCarthy have not yet decided whether the winter schedule will include participation by the champion in the two big money events on the west coast, the Los Angeles and Augusta Callie opens. 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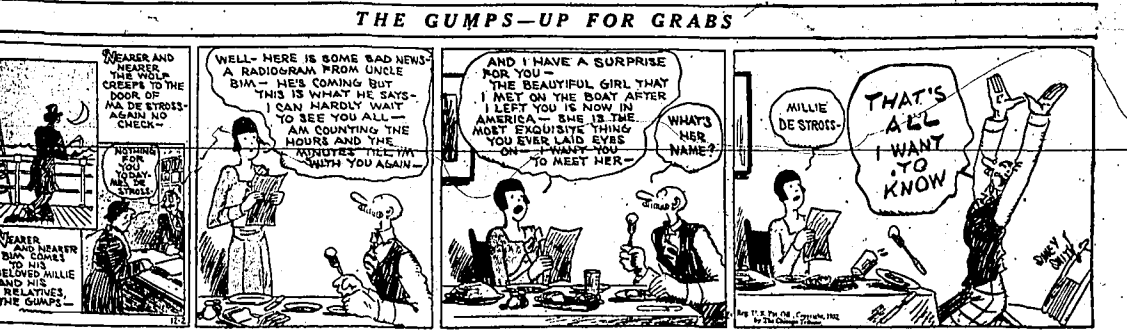
