Turner, pioneer banker, business man, political leader and beloved citizen of Kimberly, gathered in the face of bitter cold weather, to indicate their respect for a devoted and conscientious community leader.

Rev. J. Elliott Simpson, Twin Falls, minister of the Kimberley Christian church, paid eloquent tribute to the life of Mr. Turner, and after seven principal addresses he had in his life of service.

From Revelation, 2:10, Rev. Simpson read the words: "The one faithful to death, and will give them a crown of life," and spoke of Mr. Turner's interest in the church and his interest in the life of his service.

From Matthew, 23:3, the minister selected the words, "Truly as the Lord liveth, and as thy soul liveth, there is but a spike between me and death," and spoke of the sufferings of the late William H. Turner.

A Life of Service

"A good name is better than precious ointment; and the day of death than the day of one's birth," from Ecclesiastes 7:1, was the text for a comment on the devoted service of his life. Also Rev. Simpson quoted Romans 14:7, "None of us liveth to himself, and no man dieth to himself."

From Matthew, 23:23, Rev. Simpson took the words "Render therefore unto Caesar the things which are Caesar's; and unto God the things that are God's," and told Mr. Turner's principles as regarded his political work.

Mr. Turner consented to enter a political field as a representative in the state legislature, not for himself, but upon the advice of his friends, when he was convinced that he might be of service to his fellow men by that step," the minister stated.

FARMERS DEMAND DEBT MORATORIUM

Conference at Washington Adopts Legislative Program for Congressmen

Earlier, the delegates also urged government price-fixing for agricultural commodities and a \$500,000,000 loan program to aid the "distressed farm population."

Glimpsing a day-long meeting to agree on a program to submit to congress tomorrow, the conference voted approval of the following demands:

"A moratorium on mortgages, interest, and rents for all farmers whose volume of production has recently attained the farm family at a decent standard of living."

"Cancellation of back farm taxes and fees and seed loans and debts for supplies and furnishing for farm production."

"Government has always been and is now to carry the debt load and support the family at a minimum health standard. (Marginal farmers, share croppers and others)."

"Cancellation of future farm taxes during the crisis."

"During this national crisis congress must declare all foreclosures, evictions and seizures of property and evictions illegal."
