England Pays America In Gold After Italy Presents Installment

London, Dec. 14 (AP)—Unfavorable weather forced Amy Johnson, flying from Cape Town, England, to land today at Beniouga, Morocco. She planned to resume her flight across the Atlas mountains to Omsay as soon as the weather cleared.

Mrs. Johnson, the wife of Captain J. A. Millon, British trans-Atlantic flier, took off from Gao, French West Africa, Wednesday morning, hoping to reach Omsay by night. She is attempting to make the Cape-to-England flight in less time than it took her recently when she set a new record from England to the Cape. That record is 4 days 8 hours 35 minutes.

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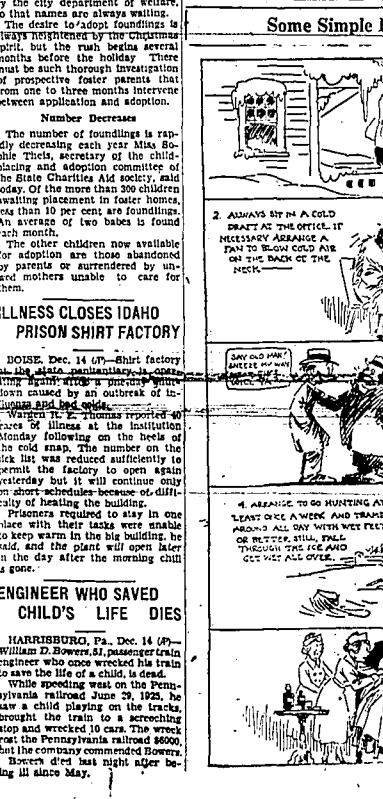

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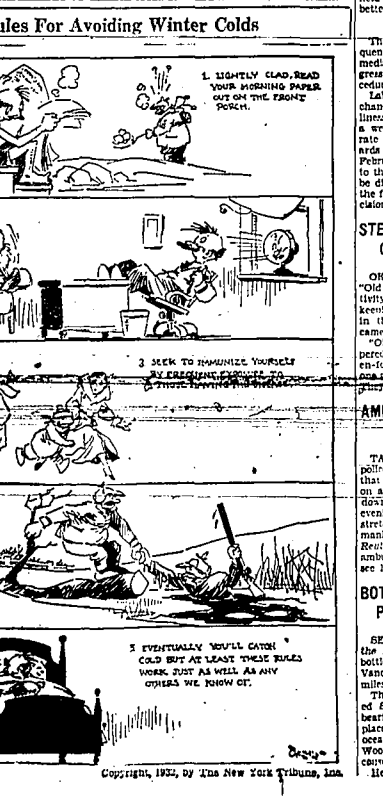

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### GRANGERS SPONSOR FORECLOSURE DELAY

Secretary of Idaho State Grange Issues Statement Involving Farm Mortgages

CALDWELL, Dec. 14 (Special to The News)—A movement to support postponement of farm mortgage foreclosures, sponsored by the Idaho Grange, was announced through the office of the secretary here today. The secretary's statement follows:

"The condition of our commodity markets has created a situation for Idaho farmers in which there are few farms that are not threatened by foreclosures. The Federal Farm Loan bank and some others are making very reasonable efforts to bring over these farm properties for their owners, while some banks and loaning companies are not so cognizant of the utility of mortgage foreclosures at the present time.

"The resolution that follows was adopted by the executive committee of the Idaho State Grange, December 4.

"Resolution by the executive committee of the Idaho State Grange—Whereas mortgage foreclosures at this time are wholly futile, accomplish nothing for the creditor, and such actions are highly anti-social in their consequences; and whereas the Federal Farm Loan bank and some loaning companies have adopted constructive policies postponing foreclosure proceedings on mortgages, both chattel and real.

"It is resolved that we, the Idaho State Grange executive committee, commend such a humane policy, and urge that such action be taken in all those holders of similar mortgages in Idaho, and that we request that these loans be reviewed with lower rates of interest under an amortization plan;

"And be it further requested that we ask the co-operation of all civic bodies to join the Idaho Grange in bringing public notice that this program may be made statewide;

"And be it further resolved that we send copies of this resolution to the civic bodies and to the press."

### WENDELL MARKETS HOLIDAY TURKEYS

Association Sells Six Cars To One Firm, Making Total 1932 Shipments 17 Cars

WENDELL, Dec. 14 (Special to The News)—The Gooding County Turkey Growers' association shipped six cartons of turkeys to Philadelphia in the last week. The birds were sent to a large chain store system, which operates more than 3000 units throughout the East. There were approximately 11,000 birds weighing approximately 160,000 pounds. The advance price was 8 cents a pound for prime birds. The total advance for the six cartons was \$15,000. The association expects a final settlement a week after Christmas. Prices will be based on the retail price in Philadelphia.

The six cartons graded more than 90 per cent prime.

Management of the association expects the best business of marketing will be the most beneficial to the growers, as the turkeys are sold direct to the wholesaler, eliminating the commission man and jobber. E. C. Commons, manager of the association, has been working on this plan for some time, but this is the first time such a sale scheme has been used here.

Gooding county is considered the largest turkey growing county in the state.

Joe Vogner, near Gannett, delivered about 300 birds alive, but all others came from Gooding county. J. B. Harrison, Wendell, brought in the largest single flock, composed of approximately 140-Wipers, Miller and DeWitt breeds, in the largest individual birds. The largest number of turkeys dressed in one day was 100. The plan was to breed the association shipment, Swift and company shipped two cartons; Gooding county, one; and Wendell, two cars, and Mrs. Brink's association, one car. This makes a total of 11 cars shipped for the Christmas market; another six cars were shipped at Thanksgiving time.

POWER COMPANIES GET REBATES FROM BOISE

BOISE, Dec. 14 (AP)—Rebates on power charges to irrigators under pumping projects were fixed today by the state board of irrigation...

The rebates represent refunds to the power companies which in turn are based on the irrigation fee amount represented by the percentage of the companies' output which is devoted to producing power for pumping irrigation projects.

The law authorizing it has been the subject of heated debate in the legislature for several years. Several counties protesting the loss of taxable property through the exemptions, but pumping irrigation decreasing their projects could not exist without the exemptions.

Gets \$25,312 Rebate
The Idaho power company, the board determined, devoted 13.95 per cent of its facilities to irrigation pumping in the counties affected. Its total rebate was \$25,312, divided as follows:

Idaho Power Co., \$12,500; Bonneville Power Co., \$10,000; Snake River Power Co., \$2,812.

HOLD-UP MEN GET COLLECTOR'S CASH

Martin Wegener, Shell Oil Company Employee, Reports Loss of \$200 to \$300

Martin Wegener, deliveryman for the Shell Oil company, reported to the police at 6:30 o'clock last evening that he had just been robbed of between \$200 and \$300 by two men who called him into the alley at the rear of the Elks Temple, corner of Shawnee street and Second avenue.

He was unable to describe the hold-up men, except that one was a large man, and the other somewhat smaller.

He did not say whether either of the men was armed.

Officers found the knotted handkerchief on the ground where Mr. Wegener said the hold-up men left him.

As soon as they left, he said, he walked to the police station, only about a half-block away.

He said he could not tell exactly the amount of money that was taken, because he had been collecting during the afternoon and evening, and was carrying it to his home in the Rex Arms apartments when the hold-up men stopped him.

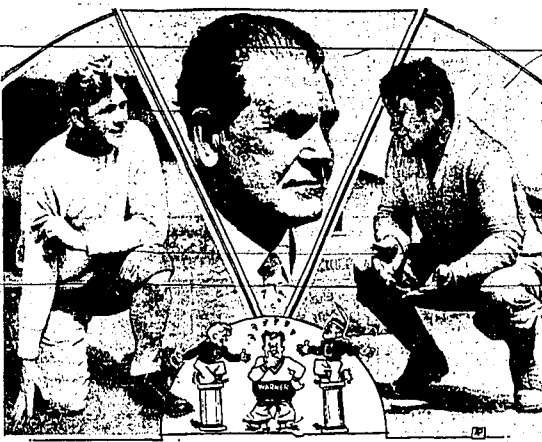

The state senator-elect announced the subject, that he was still his original opinion.

Among four citizens who accepted the invitation of the legislative delegation-elect to submit recommendations at this meeting, were two former members of the legislature, former Senator J. H. Seaver, and former State Commissioner L. Hodgins, and a good deal of time was given over to discussion of practical legislative administration methods. Both former members were questioned in this regard by members of the newly elected delegation, none of whom have had previous legislative experience.

Mr. Seaver urged remodeling of the farm produce license law to exempt cash buyers from its terms. Mr. Hodgins, however, in 1928, he said, requires cash buyers to secure license and furnish bond, and as a consequence it has operated to handicap cash buyers. The Idaho legislature materially handicapping the marketing of Idaho farm products.

He also recommended the adoption of a gasoline standard.

Mr. Hodgins, a member of the Idaho national guard, brought to the attention of the legislative delegation the appropriation of some \$7,000 to make each battery of the Idaho national guard, and explained that approximately three-fourths of that amount is expended for rent of armories. The federal government appropriation for the Idaho national guard, he said, is \$23,000 for the past biennium, of which \$20,000 was for pay of officers and men, and about \$3,000 was expended for Idaho farm products used by the guard organizations.

Idaho national guard, he submitted, pays its way in various training it affords to its members and in readiness to serve as it did a year ago in combating forest fires.

D. J. Koenig, director of the Twin Falls Cooperative Dairy's association and member of the Grange, urged favorable consideration of a measure to be presented by the Dairy Council to restrict dispersal of contagious abortion infected cattle as a means of safeguarding health.

He spoke also regarding a sales tax measure, and questioned the visibility on the grounds that it affords a fluctuating and variable basis for taxation, that might be eroded by other industries much more readily than by agriculture.

Would Change Pension Laws Speaking for the more liberal of county commissioners, Mr. Barnes recommended remodeling of both monthly pension and old-age pension laws to provide that both should be paid by the state rather than as now by the counties. These pensions will cost Twin Falls county \$35,000 this year, he said. There is tendency on the part of prospective pensioners to gravitate to a few larger centers in the state, imposing a heavy burden upon families in which those centers are situated, he said. A state-wide tax for payment of pensioners, he argued, would be a better method.

Further recommendation by the commissioners was that county pensions be paid for four years, by districts rather than by vote in the county at large; that they should be elected for four-year terms, that terms should be dovetailed so that there would always be at least one member with previous experience on the board.
