(Continued From Page One) for the last 10 years. "The 1932 crop was larger than in any of the last ten years, though still below the usual level. "The current movement of people back to the farm, however, does not seem to be a permanent one. It has helped to maintain conditions under present adverse conditions, but as yet it has had no measurable effect in increasing the output of agricultural products, except possibly through the production of some crops like home lawns. "Estimating winter wheat production at 482,151,000 bushels, compared with 477,000,000 in 1931, the board ascribed the difference to "decreased plantings, especially in the North Central states and increased yields in all areas except in the Far Western states."

# Major League Magnates End Owners' Dispute With Landis

## Club Proprietors Approve of Yank And Card Systems

Joint Session Also Adopts Policy of "Home Rule" For All Clubs on Broadcasting of Season Games

(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, Dec. 15 — Long-standing differences between Baseball Commissioner and the owners of the "chain-store" systems were today by a resolution adopted by the joint meeting of National and American league magnates.

In effect the club owners removed any legal weapons Commissioner Landis possessed for use in combating development of "chain-store" baseball and put their stamp of approval on the systems now most conspicuously identified with the New York Yankees and St. Louis Cardinals, but involving most of the clubs of the two leagues.

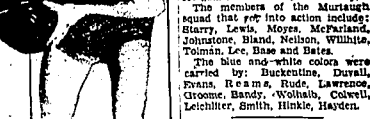

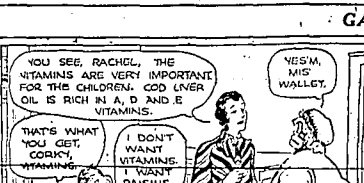


