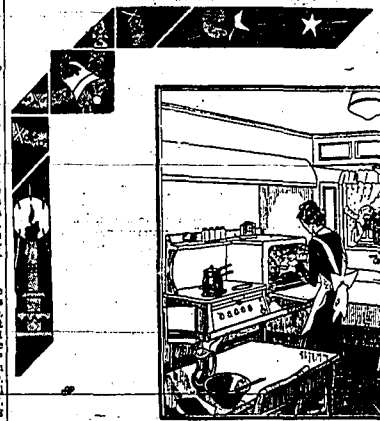

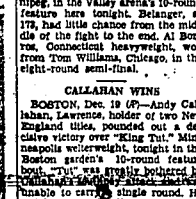

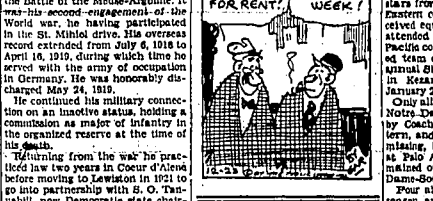

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SHOSHONE FALLS COMES TO CITY AS CHRISTMAS GIFT

F. J. Adams, Omaha Business Man, Turns Over Region On South Side of Cataract for use as Park

A tract of approximately 25 acres on the south side of Snake River canyon at Shoshone Falls has been given by F. J. Adams, Omaha business man, to the city of Twin Falls as a Christmas gift "to be forever held for park purposes only for the beneficial use and enjoyment of all the people."

Twin Falls city council, with preliminary approval, at a meeting held last evening, voted to accept this gift. It was presented through Mr. J. S. Swartz, former state senator, and Mr. E. Morse, Twin Falls architect, with whom Mr. Adams had conferred on the subject relative to plans for improvement of the property, and in later years for placing the premises beyond the reach of mortality or individual bias.

Mr. Adams' letter authorizing the gift was read to Senator E. Morse. He said:

"You will know that my aspirations have always been to have the public having control of my holdings at Shoshone Falls. I have therefore decided to offer my south side holdings to the town of Twin Falls as a Christmas gift, and I hope you will accept and forward to me a quit claim deed, stipulating that the property shall be forever held for park purposes only for the beneficial use and enjoyment of all the people."

Mr. Charles E. Scott, chairman of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce, and H. P. Farry, president of the chamber, had been told of Mr. Adams' purpose to give the Shoshone Falls park to the city. Senator Swartz told the council, and both he said, had voted enthusiastically in approval and appreciation of the Shoshone Falls project.

Consolidated Holdings
It is known to have been Mr. Adams' desire that the Shoshone Falls property should someday be converted into a national park. During the past several years he had consolidated holdings comprising the tract that he has now turned over to the city. The nucleus of this tract was Mrs. Adams' share in the estate of her father who was a business man of Montana. Mrs. Adams' father and Senator Clark, many years ago, purchased the tract, which was built on it a hotel, which was destroyed by fire several years ago. C. E. Wolgast, a resident now of southern California, held a part of this tract for a time and he, many years ago, erected the first building on this site.

The property which Mr. Adams has turned over to the city extends from a point a little below the brink of the falls on the west, along the water's edge to the point where the water runs to the east, and extends southward from the river to include a considerable part of the first owned land in the canyon. It also includes a considerable tract of land on the north side of the canyon at Shoshone Falls.

The tract that has been turned over to the city was included at one time in a proposed state memorial park, for which the state legislature appropriated \$100,000. Senator Swartz recalled that, and something more than \$1000 of money raised locally was spent for development plans.

Sees Many Possibilities
Among those with whom Mr. Adams had conferred relative to the Shoshone Falls project was Thomas R. Kimball, Omaha architect, who in several past years has been the sponsor of a "group of kindred spirits" of an association to be called the "Shoshone Falls Park Association."

Mr. Kimball's report pointed out possibilities for boating and other aquatic sports, fishing, hunting and hiking, and camping at Shoshone Falls. He suggested also the development of an art center in this locality, which would be an attractive setting similar to, but more restrained in color and extent than the one at the falls. The present subject of the south side is being born.

"We are told," Mr. Kimball said.
