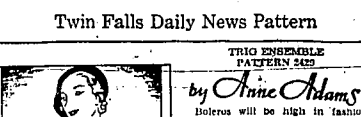

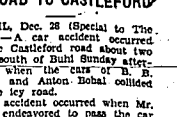

NEW YORK, Dec. 28.—By way of variety, the stock market tried a rally today, but was not particularly successful in its attempt.

By closing time, early gains running up to a couple of points had either been well pared or completely lost and a few stocks had experienced considerable selling pressure.

Steady on the contrary, held up somewhat greater advance, especially the carrier lines. Grains recovered from record lows when it was learned that receipts of wheat and corn at important centers had been severely reduced.

Start Uncertainly
Stocks started uncertainly, but support for New York Central, which jumped 2 points, brought rally into speculative prominence and buying extended to other groups. By noon, however, the market began to waver and prices thereafter sagged gradually.

Weakness of General Motors discouraged professionals interested in the rise for that industrial leader was actively offered and lost a narrow fraction. DuPont weakened in sympathy.

Steel shares had a late sinking spell, though their losses were relatively small. United States Steel's decline was 4, but the preferred was up a point. Allsteel, Westinghouse and a number of rails were among the stocks to finish either fractionally or about a point higher.

New York Central had the most extreme rise. Total transfers were 1,681,261 shares, the largest in six weeks.

A few railroads reported larger loadings for last week than for the same period of last year. It may have been a reason for celebration, although the fact that Christmas fell in different weeks in the two years was partly responsible for the better showing. Increases recorded by New York Central, Pennsylvania and St. Paul were the first over 1931 for any week of 1932.

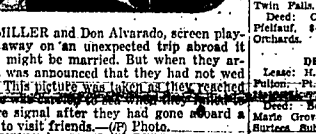

STREET PAVEMENT BONDHOLDERS SUE

Twin Falls Local Improvement District Creditors
Assert Claims for \$73,754

Holders of unpaid bonds issued by the Twin Falls local improvement district here yesterday to collect and reconstruct streets totaling \$73,754, plus interest, penalties and attorneys' fees. These bonds were due and payable July 1, 1932, and at that time, according to the complaints in these suits, there were unpaid bonds of district 24 totaling \$22,352.50; of the original issue of \$21,352.50; district 27, \$8,299.73 out of the \$12,712.40; district 28, \$4,221.06 out of the original \$4,223.33; original issue.

Since then, the complaints recite, there has been paid on account of the bonds of district 24, \$2,192.21 leaving a balance of \$20,160.29; district 27, \$4,927.27, leaving a balance of \$3,371.46; district 28, \$4,221.06, leaving a balance of \$4,221.06. The bondholders' claims in these suits are based upon these unpaid balances. Property included in the local improvement districts, on which paving assessments have not been paid, constitute the bondholders' security upon which they are suing to force their liens.

In the complaints drafted and filed by R. B. Smith, Twin Falls, attorney for the bondholders, claims have been segregated. In one action, William E. Brooks, to benefit of himself and all other bondholders similarly situated, is suing to collect and reconstruct streets in district 24; in another action August 24th similarly is suing for reconstruction of streets in district 27, and in the third suit R. B. Whitlow is suing in behalf of holders of unpaid bonds on district 28.

City Serves As Trustee

David Patrick, 87-year-old pioneer Iowa farmer and Twin Falls resident since 1914, died at the county general hospital here at 11:35 A. M. Wednesday following two weeks' illness with influenza and complications. Arrangements for funeral services were held in advance of his death, awaiting word from relatives elsewhere. The body rests at the Drake mortuary.

Unusually hale and vigorous for a man of his years, Mr. Patrick was actively engaged in business in connection with extensive investments and interests here, until five days before he was taken to the hospital on Monday or last week. A life-long ardent sportsman and lover of the outdoors, Mr. Patrick only a day or two before the end came, was out to take a friend fishing in his boat when the next fishing season opens.
