**FIVE-YEAR PLAN GETS REAL TEST**

Russia Embarks On Period Part Adds For Second Part of Experimentation

STANLEY P. ROBINSON Associated Press Staff Correspondent

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MOSCOW, Dec. 31.—Russia embarks tomorrow on the period of the second five-year plan, designed to complete the reconstruction of the national economy on a socialist basis and to double the rate of living standard of the masses.

The five-year plan begins to put the membership of the "right" opposition side of the government's agricultural program in carrying out the government's agricultural program.

Notwithstanding the progress made under the first five-year plan which ends at midnight tonight after having run four years and three months, the country still lags behind in the economic field.

Alleviation of the strain of this situation furnished one of the primary aims of the five-year plan.

Final destruction of the remaining capitalist elements so as to completely abolish the class character and complete collectivization of land are the other principal objectives.

The chief interest of the average citizen, who during the past two years has watched the development of the plan, undoubtedly centers in the party's promise to provide the population with the necessities of life in the quantity and quality of material articles of consumption, including food—production by the end of the second five-year plan.

Specific remedies to be applied have not yet been made known, but the reports are that they will be drastic.

The immediate industry by which it is to be completely abolished is the development of light industry, so as to meet the necessities of the masses and other necessities to the villages in order to furnish an incentive to the peasant to increase his productivity.

Denial of investment.

With this in mind, capital investments in the country will be doubled in 1933 as compared with 1932, and at the same time a broad effort will be centered in the development of local industries here, before neglected in an attempt to bring a substantial increase in the production of consumer goods.

More immediate and specific steps to increase the peasantry, who fell down badly in the sowing and harvesting of this year's crop, are predicted for the near future.

It was chiefly because local communities party leadership proved unable to prevent failure in the government's grain collection program, some provinces bringing considerable loss of the harvest, that it is not advised to substitute efforts to demoralize the peasant of collectivization. The party housekeeping was ordered.

"There is an overproduction of beans at the present time," the company agent said, "but what these new selections will do will be to cut the cost of production per bushel, and not necessarily increase the yield."

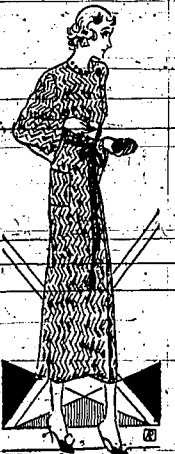

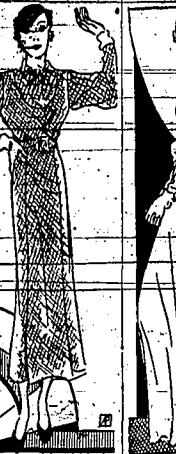

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## Italian Advises Women To Guard Sports Pursuits

ROME, Dec. 31—Convinced that Italian women should not try to compete in the more strenuous athletic sports—such as football and soccer—but rather "sporty" women of the Anglo-Saxon race, Prof. Umberto Gobbi, director of the medical clinic of the University of Parma.

By doing so they would make the most of their modest figures, and opportunities for bringing their children into the world, his father had advised that the peril the future of the nation by placing difficulties in the way of Mussolini's plans for a physically sound race.

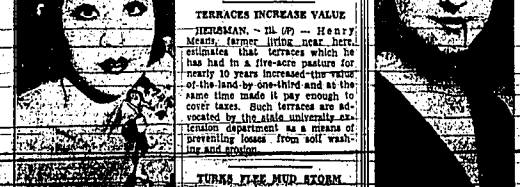

Comparatively little belting has been reported in the game. But Southern California received a decided reputation in the wagers noted, some odds being as long as 2 to 1.

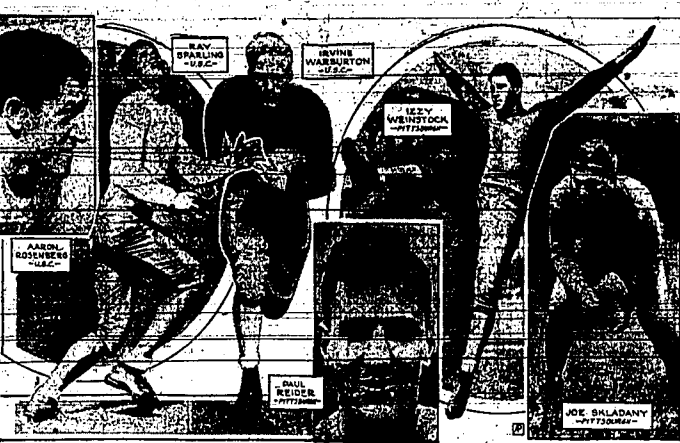
