CALVIN COOLIDGE'S SUDDEN DEATH FROM HEART ATTACK PLUNGES PEOPLE INTO GRIEF

Sorrow Mingles With Amazement Throughout Land
Audible Gasp Follows Announcement by Senator

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—Amazement and sorrow mingled in a grief-stricken capital tonight as it learned of the sudden death of Calvin Coolidge.

President Hoover led the homeward-bound procession, leading a public demonstration during a month of national mourning.

With an endless stream of condolences and eulogies pouring from all parts of the nation, the chief executive dispatched his own and sent White House naval and military aides there to give funeral arrangements.

Senator Borah Joins With President Hoover and Others In Paying Tribute
Plugs at Half-Mast
Within five minutes after word of death reached the capital, the flags on government buildings and in the city were hauled to half-mast by silent workers.

Senator Robinson expressed confidence the senate would pass the bill this afternoon by a vote of 70-20.

Speaker Garner named a committee of five to represent the house in the funeral procession.

Senator Borah, Republican, Idaho, was the first to speak at the funeral.

JOHN W. DAVIS, who opposed Mr. Coolidge for the presidency in 1924, spoke at his funeral.

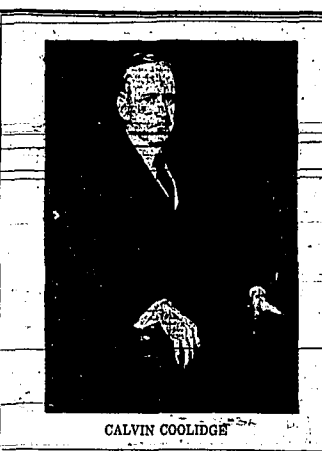

Nation's Former First Lady Finds Body of Husband
Ex-chief Magistrate Leaves Office Early for Home, Complaining of Supposed Attack of Indigestion

(By The Associated Press) NORTHAMPTON, Mass., Jan. 5 (AP)—The former first lady of the United States for five and a half years, died of a heart attack which struck him with startling suddenness today.

The body was found in a bedroom in the suburban home, The Beeches, in Northampton, returned from a shopping tour, found his body lying on the floor.

After Mrs. Coolidge found him it was 12 1/2 hours before Dr. W. Brown, a friend of hers, was summoned immediately. Dr. Brown said death had occurred about 15 minutes before.

Mrs. Coolidge, though stunned by the death, was in her room and tonight joined her son, John, in arranging plans for the funeral.

Plan Simple Service
The service at 10:30 A. M. Saturday in the Edwards Congregational church here where Mrs. Coolidge was a member for 20 years.
