AXE HANGS OVER BUDGET FIGURES

Commissioner Estimates
\$22,000 Must Be Lopped
Off Proposed Expenses

Proposed 1933 budgets for Twin Falls county's current expense and hospital and poor funds totaling \$247,816, must be reduced by approximately \$22,000 to come within the limits of the maximum tax levies for these funds, one member of the board of county commissioners, estimated last evening.

The commissioners since last Monday when the newly elected board took office, have been studying the proposed budget, out of which they must devise a tentative budget to be submitted to a public hearing on February 13. Thereafter the commissioners must adopt a final budget and appropriation bill for the county for 1933.

Valuation shrinkage. Although the proposed budgets, as compiled by the several county officers and departments, total \$247,816, the board estimates that the \$25,174 less than the tentative budget of a year ago, when maximum taxes were levied for both funds, the county's current expense has been a shrinkage of property valuation in the county so that a one-half tax which yielded \$300 last year will not yield as much this year. In addition, it was pointed out, there has been considerable decline in the county's income through revenue yielding offices and institutions.

The maximum tax levied for current expense fund is 40 mills, and for hospital and poor fund, 25 mills.

Reduction in 1932.

County commissioners last year, following the public hearing, reduced the 1932 current expense fund levy from \$127,623 to \$125,775, and the hospital and poor fund levy for that year from \$113,000 to \$49,385.

The commissioners proposed 1933 budgets, totaling \$247,816, for the county, \$14,000 for pensions of indigent and blind persons; \$3,000 for an audit, and \$4,000 for general reserve.

The sale yesterday was to have been held under an attachment lately obtained by Katherine Reinhardt, Franklin county, a Washington corporation, which claimed to have secured Dean's claim against the property through an assignment.

In addition to the restraining order stopping the sale, Mr. Dean asked for a court order declaring the purported assignment of his claim to be null and void, and for judgment for the plus interest in satisfaction of his claim on a promissory note secured by the mortgage.

Frank L. Sheehan and J. H. Harford, Twin Falls, attorneys, represent Mr. Dean in these proceedings.

Twin Falls County Commissioners Report 140 Pensioners Share In Payments

One hundred forty persons divided \$16,164 old-age pensions which Twin Falls county paid last year out of hospital and poor fund last money, according to a report which Twin Falls county commissioners presented to the state house. The old-age pension law, which was adopted by the 1931 session of the state legislature, was not made effective in this county until last year. The commissioners reported that there were last year 205 applicants for old-age pensions in this county, of which 140 were granted; 35 were denied and 30 were cancelled. Two old-age pensioners in this county were reported to be receiving \$2 per month each, and two others are getting \$22 per month each. These are the high and low figures. However, most are very low, there are 31 old-age pensioners receiving \$3 per month; 83 receiving \$4 per month; and 16 receiving \$5 per month, the commissioners reported.

Records Disclose Foreclosures Rise

Federal home loan bank board's economist, Washington, District of Columbia, the Federal Land bank of Spokane have applied to Twin Falls county recorder office for a statement relating to real estate mortgage foreclosures and foreclosures on farm lands. Figures compiled in response to the federal home loan bank board's request show that there were 104 real estate mortgage foreclosures in Twin Falls county from July, 1923, to June, 1927, and that there were 104 real estate mortgage foreclosures in this county during the year 1927. During January, last year there were 12 foreclosures; February, 11; March, 14; April, 11; May, 10; June, 8; July, 8; August, 7; September, 3; October, 2; November, 4; December, 15.

During the year ending October 31, 1927, according to figures compiled by the recorder's office in response to the Spokane Federal Land bank's request, there were 100 foreclosures of farm lands in this county. Of these foreclosures, 10 were made by the Federal Land bank of Spokane; 21 by insurance companies; 23 by other mortgage companies; 2 by state or governmental agencies; 23 by miscellaneous parties.

President Sets Prisoner Free

The president of the United States yesterday ordered released a prisoner confined in Twin Falls county jail since last November 6 under a federal act enacted for alleged violation of the prohibition act. The released prisoner, Nick Labella, 24, Spokane, was brought here from the federal prison at McNeil Island, on completion of a term there for alleged liquor violation, to serve four months in the jail here. The president's commutation provided the jail authorities should give him at once, and also that a \$500 fine should be remitted. Federal court officials in Idaho, and authorities at McNeil Island were said to have interested themselves in Labella's behalf. Word of the president's intervention came to Sheriff E. F. Prater in telegrams yesterday from William Mitchell, assistant attorney general, Sutherland, Idaho deputy United States marshal.
