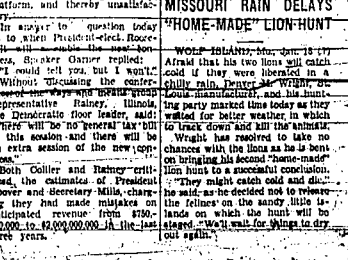
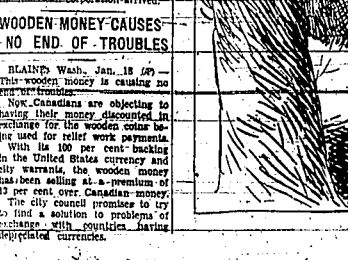

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DIVORCE PUTS END TO PROSECUTION
District Court Dismisses Non-Support Charge Against Father of Five

Twin Falls county's prosecuting attorney today announced that he had discontinued his prosecution of Judge W. A. Bebook in the district court here yesterday that he did not intend to continue with prosecution of a divorced man on a misdemeanor charge of failure to provide necessities of life for his children. The county attorney advised that of the prosecutor and the motion was granted, relieving the prosecutor from filing an information in the case, and the charge was dismissed. Evidence at a preliminary hearing indicated that the accused man, Joseph Detton, was engaged in wood hauling during the period of the alleged neglect, and his children ranging in age from four to 14 years, last April to October.

Craven is a high school district judge. Mrs. Craven's attorney, W. C. Chapman, said additional time was necessary to complete "audits necessary for proper presentation of the case. Continuance of the motion was set for next Saturday. The prosecuting attorney indicated that he would not resist the motion.

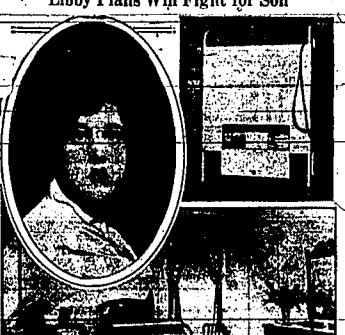

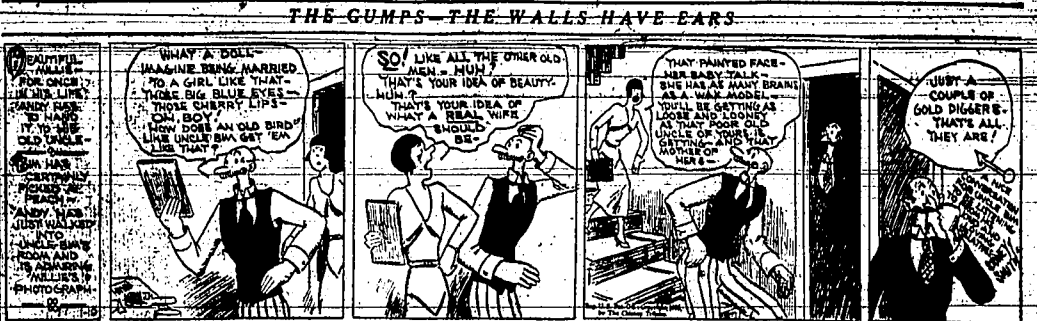

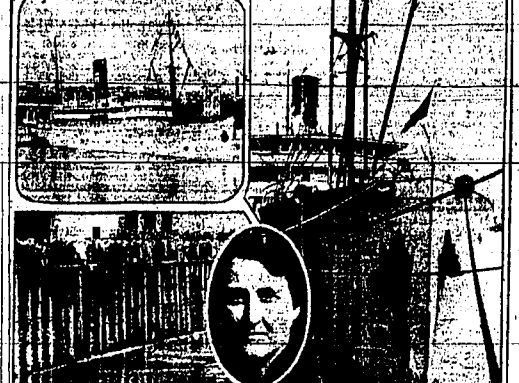

MICHIGAN'S BEANS UNSETTLE MARKET SHAYS G. P. BOWLES Exceptionally Heavy Yield In Eastern State Appears As Big Factor in Making For Stagnation of Demand

An exceptionally heavy yield of high quality beans in Michigan last season was a big factor making for stagnation of the demand for the 1932 crop of Great-Northern beans produced in Idaho, Washington and Wyoming. G. P. Bowles, manager of the Southern Idaho Wholesale Grocery company, told members of Twin Falls Rotary club at weekly meeting at luncheon at the Park hotel yesterday. Mr. Bowles had been asked to give a minute talk on the bean market situation, but interest in the subject was so keen that he was kept for 50 minutes discussing details and answering questions.

Michigan beans produced in 1932 were 28 per cent, of the entire Idaho beans 1932 bean crop. It was Michigan's largest and best bean crop since 1925. This big crop produced in close proximity to the market for beans, Mr. Bowles showed, was most readily available to the market in which speculative demand is high for outlets, and in which cornputable demand was severely curtailed because of non-employment of the laboring force. Beans are, normally, the largest commodities of beans.

Ordinarily, Mr. Bowles showed, the beans are sold to canners. Canning, however, involves an element of speculation and canners have been slow to enter the market for the 1932 crop. One Michigan dealer reported sale of 800 bags to canners during last week, as compared with 15,000 bags to canners during a fortnight a year ago.

In the absence of canners' demand, the Michigan bean crop was thrown, with the advantage of high freight rates for short haul, on the eastern and middle-western markets in competition with the Great Northern crop. A recent survey of bean stocks in the hands of Eastern and Central states dealers showed 50 per cent Michigan beans; 12 per cent Great Northern; 22 per cent Pinto, 9 per cent Lima, and 7 per cent other. During the first three months of the 1932 season, beginning in September, as compared with 10-year averages, Michigan shipped 94 per cent of its bean crop, New Mexico, 20 per cent; California, 16 per cent; New York, 12 per cent; Wyoming, 47 per cent; Idaho, 68 per cent; Montana, 61 per cent.

Government figures to which Mr. Bowles referred showed that there was 30 per cent net decline in the United States bean crop last year. The Great Northern bean producing area reduced production in 1932 to 114,000 bushels, as compared with a five-year average of 25,480 bushels. Imported beans received at the port of San Francisco last December totaled, 400,000 bushels, as compared with 1,930,000 bushels in December, 1931, and as compared with 66,746 bushels in December, 1930.

Yesterday's Rotary club meeting was arranged by Frank F. Hasch, Oregon Shore Line agent, who is secretary of the program chairman for the period.

California, he showed, produces a wide variety of beans and aids, enjoys the advantage of water transportation to the Atlantic coast, while the Great Northern production in Colorado and New Mexico is consumed largely in the mountain states.

The principal markets for Great Northern beans, he showed, are in the Eastern and Central states, which this year, in consequence of a variety of circumstances, have been largely supplied by the big Michigan crop.

Refers to Statistics Mr. Bowles referred to government statistics showing diminishing world production of beans during the past few years, in consequence of bean importation into this country. The world's bean crop in 1932, he stated, was 10,375,000 bushels.
