AMENDMENT 20 TO CONSTITUTION GETS 95 STATES' VOTES

Legislators, From Coast To Coast Favor Abolition Of 'Lame Duck' Sessions Of Federal Legislature

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—A
wiping annihilation of sen-
timents in legislative circles
today carried a
constitutional amendment to the con-
gress, the one that will abolish
'lame ducks' to the verge of ratifi-
cation.
Twenty-five states were on record
for it. None has opposed and the
favorable action of but one more
was needed to make this modifica-
tion of government procedure a per-
manent part of the fundamental law
of the land. Under it, congress will
meet every year on January 3, and every
four years the president will be in-
augurated on March 1, instead of
March 4.
The short session of congress, in
which members who were defeated
in November continue to serve until
March, will be abolished. As the
amendment, sure to be ratified with
a few days' delay, will meet every
next October 15, the present session
is the last for the lame ducks.

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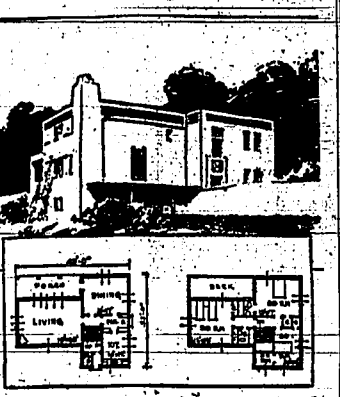

TRENCKINCK HERD AGAIN TOPS LIST

Twin Falls Dairymen's Registered Holsteins Hang Up Production Record

A herd of 19 registered Holstein cows belonging to L. J. Trenckinck, Twin Falls, again led all herds in the local live active dairy herd improvement associations with a record of average production last December of 44.4 pounds of butterfat, and 103 pounds of milk, according to a report by D. J. Flour, extension manager, registered herds, at the meeting of the Twin Falls Dairymen's Association, held at the home of Mrs. E. H. Hill, Twin Falls, Jan. 19.

The December average production of 1932 in 43 Idaho herds was 35.34 pounds of butterfat and 97.53 pounds of milk. The herd that most nearly approached the Trenckinck herd record in December was the one owned and operated by J. E. Archer, Boise, which averaged 41.3 pounds of butterfat and 85.5 pounds of milk, with all cows producing. All of the Trenckinck herd cows are two-year-old animals except one which is three years old.

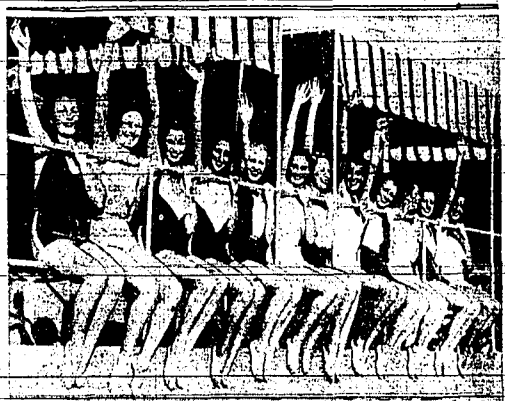

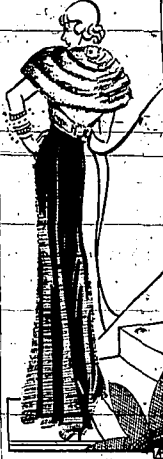

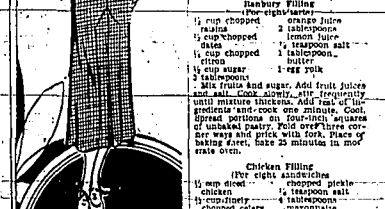

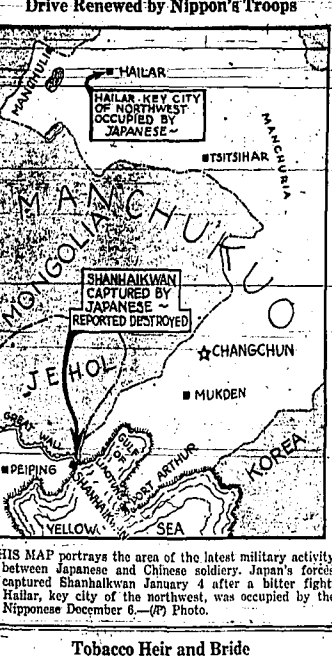
