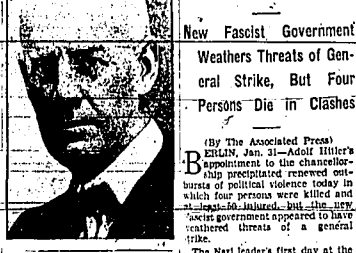

## 33 Nations Net Stars Compete

Possibility of Loss of Cup By France Brings About Record-Breaking Entry

PARIS, Jan. 31 (AP)—Apparently spurred on by the possibility that the Davis cup will be wrested from France where it has been for 22 years, the record-equalling total of 33 nations today entered for the 10th international tennis play.

The entry list is three greater than in 1931 and 1932 and is equalled only by that of the boom year of 1928 when 34 nations entered. The four nations which have not entered since 1928 are France, Australia, South America and 24 in the South American zone.

With Australia and Japan choosing to play in Europe, it appears the main fighting will be done at Wimbledon in London.

The United States has four national entries in the North American zone. Five are entered in the South American zone and 24 in the South American zone.
