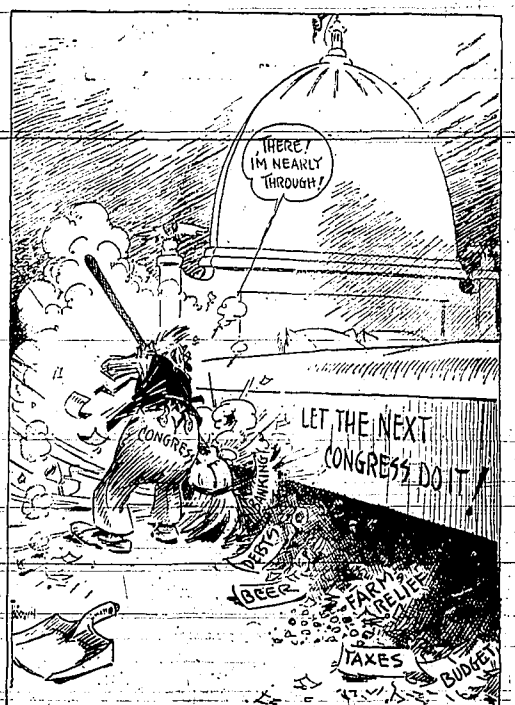

RECLASSIFICATION BILL ENTERS HOUSE IN BOISE

BOISE, Feb. 9 (AP)—A bill reclassifying the permanent income tax rates which the property valuation is less than \$10,000 was introduced in the house of the Idaho legislature today by the revenue legislation committee.

Countywide valuation in an estimate of \$10,000,000 reclassified to \$10,000 per \$100 valuation for the current estimate (and but counties between \$10,000 and \$100,000 were increased from 40 cents to 50 cents maximum between \$10,000 and \$100,000 valuation reclassified at 40 cents. 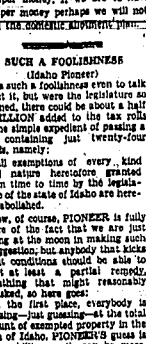

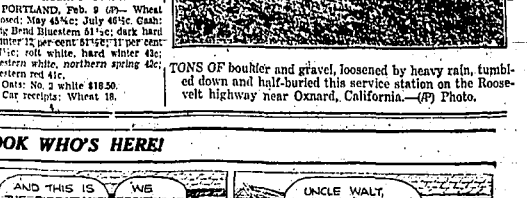

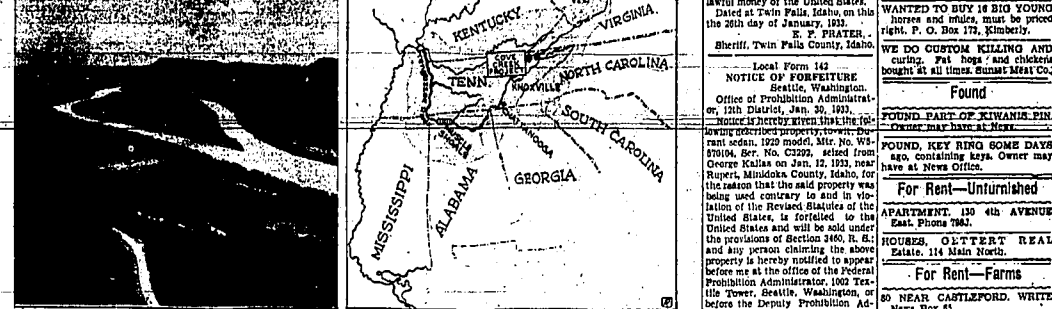
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## Roosevelt Proposes Vast Tennessee Valley Development
