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COMMITTEE WAGES SWEEPING MERGER OF ALL RAILWAYS

Students of National Problem Foresee Regulation Concentrating on Good Service at Lowest Cost

By CLAUDE A. JAGGER (Associated Press Financial Editor)

NEW YORK, Feb. 15.—A new era in transportation was being inaugurated, it was said today, as the national transportation committee published today its report on the merger of all railways.

This report, the result of four months of work, most of which was under the direction of the late Calvin Coolidge, has been the work of a committee of 15 members, including 10 railroad men and five public men.

The committee's report is based on one of the most thorough surveys that has ever been made of the nation's transport facilities, and the outlook for the roads "far more hopeful," it asserts that the "best" of the best state capital structures nor can competing forms of transportation be developed for the benefit of the railroads.

Urges Consolidation

The committee urges sweeping consolidation of the lines on a regional basis, to eliminate wasteful duplication of facilities and to reduce the number of railroads by the elimination of overlapping lines.

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WILLYS-OVERLAND COMPANY CRASHES THROUGH SCHOOL

Federal Judge Appoints Receivers to Control Plant Employing 8000 Workers

TOLEDO, Ohio, Feb. 15 (AP)—A Willys-Overland company, one of the country's largest manufacturers of automobiles for a quarter of a century, was placed in receivership today, Federal Judge George P. Ladd appointed John H. Willys, chairman of the board, and L. A. Miller, president, as receivers.

The action, filed in the name of the Monroe Auto Equipment company, a creditor, followed an all-day conference of officials of Willys-Overland and associated industries and was described unofficially as a friendly action to protect stockholders and conserve assets. J. O. Mininger, a large stockholder in Willys-Overland, is an official of the Monroe company.

The bill of complaint set up that the Willys-Overland company had current obligations of \$12,000,000 and assets of \$12,000,000 of which \$1,000,000 was in default as of last September.

It has a capital liabilities of \$12,000,000 in preferred stock and \$1,000,000 in common stock of \$10 per share.

All of complaint stated that assets of the company at a fair valuation would more than cover all liabilities.

8000 Men on Payroll

The company has had nearly 8000 men on its payroll in recent weeks and has been recalling workers every week lately helping to bring employment here to a new high point since last March.

In January the company turned over 1000 passenger cars and trucks to schedule called for 600 cars in February and 7000 in March.

The receivership action will not affect the substantial companies, except indirectly and the agreement for truck manufacture for International Harvester company will be carried out, officials said.

MURDERER STALKS THROUGH SCHOOL

Angered Husband Kills Wife, Eight-Year-Old Son and Himself in Class Room

Twenty-five terrified children and the teacher, Edith Unsworth, saw Dr. Vernon Elmer St. Paul, a dentist, slay Mrs. Eleanor Elmer and their eight-year-old son, Robert, in the classroom.

Students and teacher huddled in silent terror as the crazed man left the school, fired three bullets from the older son, Vernon, as he fled from an automobile, and then turned the fatal six-shooter on himself.

Elmer had been given a summons in a divorce suit filed yesterday by Mrs. Elmer, but had been arrested some time.

Mrs. Elmer was visiting Robert when Dr. Elmer drove up to the school. Vernon, the 8-year-old son, and Mrs. Elmer were sitting in a seat in the rear row. Learning Vernon in the car, Elmer entered and said he wished to visit Robert. Mrs. Unsworth showed him to a seat nearby.

Students Remains Stunned

As the students were returning their lesson Elmer drew his weapon and opened fire.

The first bullet struck Mrs. Elmer in the back of the head. As she fell to the floor, Dr. Elmer shot Robert through the head.

Then he drove outside, where he shot left Vernon and fired three shots at the running boy.

Dr. Elmer then turned the last bullet for himself. Returning to the classroom, he glared for a moment at the scene of terror, then put the weapon to his head. He fell dead beside the bodies of his wife and son.

"I was scared something was going to happen, because papa was new. Vernon told daddy slay him. When I heard the shots, I started running."

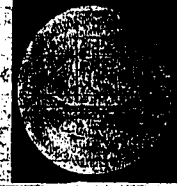

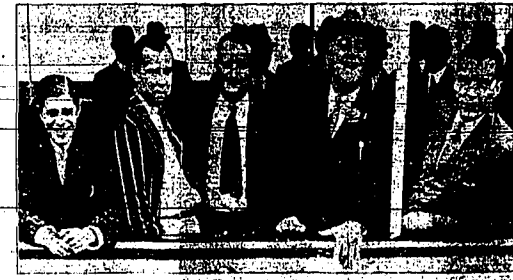
