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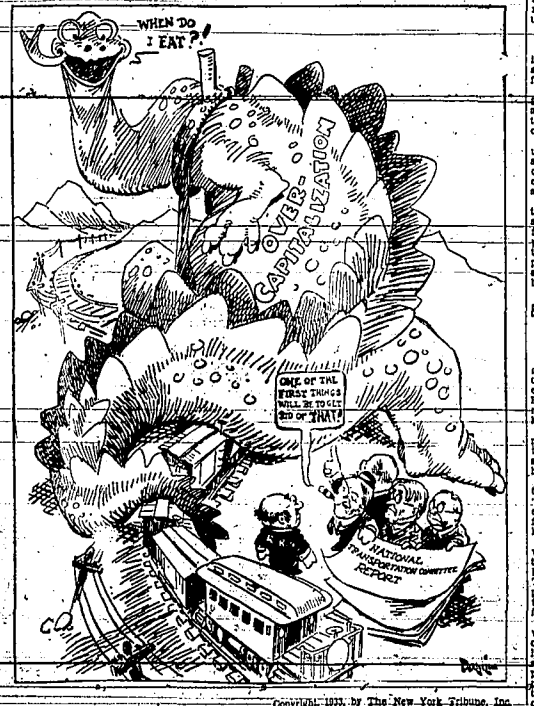
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WHALSTROM FACES CHARGE OF MURDER

Preliminary Hearing Within Next Few Days Probable, County Attorney Reports

MURDER, Feb. 23 (Special to the News.)—Whalstrom, 24, today will hear the formal charge of murder for the first time in court. The charge is made by Judge Henry Tucker's probate court, Adolph Nelson, county prosecuting attorney, announced tonight. Whalstrom, according to Sheriff P. D. Pack, confessed the murder of the man who was shot outside county nurses' ward resulted in the death of M. A. Keller, 50, nurse's father, on February 11.

Preliminary hearing, the county attorney said, will probably be held within the next few days.

SENATE APPROVES BILL TO CUT PAYROLL WHILE HOUSE VOTES SIMILARLY

SENATE APPROVAL came today, while the third, permitting physicians to issue prescriptions for liquor, was defeated in the house. Those defeated in the senate against the bill were a possession of 2.2 per cent beer.

A bill introduced in the house early this week proposed repeal of all prohibition laws in the state except those regulating "testing" prescriptions and sale to minors.

The senate passed and sent to the governor a bill limiting interest charges to 8 per cent instead of 12 per cent as at present. The bill also makes the legal rate of interest 8 per cent instead of 12 per cent. Loans made are authorized to charge a service fee.

The house defeated a bill permitting tax levy to enter into business when it is deemed by the governor, attorney general and state treasurer that the price charged by private dealers is too high. Sponsored by Representative W. O. Harrison, Rile, Democrat, Gooding, it was defeated, 23 to 25.

The bill providing for Idaho to join the state school system was withdrawn in the state senate by the author, Senator George Madison, with a speech in which he paid tribute to the Latter-Day Saints church as founders of the institution 43 years ago.

Repeals Information

He repeated the information presented to the session two years ago when a similar bill was defeated. This time, however, he urged the repeal of the educational field, adding that "all we are asking this year is that the legislature should refer to the state to assume its responsibility in the educational field by the state school and at state expense, thereby giving to at least 18 per cent of the children of the Upper Snake River valley an educational advantage which they would otherwise be denied."

The bill asked an appropriation of \$80,000 for the coming biennium for the maintenance of the education of 300 students in junior college work.

Increase in Tax

An increase in the tax on insurance premiums from 2 to 1 per cent was provided for in a bill passed by the Idaho house and sent to the senate.

It was a substitute for a former measure increasing the tax to a 2 per cent which ran into a wall of opposition. The present bill was supported by Representative Battersell, Democrat, Bannock, author of the previous measure. It varied from the other not only in the rate of taxation but in that it included fire insurance company premiums as well as "old line" insurance company premiums. Payments for mutual benefit insurance or fraternal insurance are not taxed in the bill.

Battersell said the insurance companies were "well able to pay the tax."

Representative FRENCH, DEMOCRAT, Ada assailed the tax as "an increase in the tax as it is present." He declared it was "just another sales tax." The vote for it was 20 to 25.

millions of dollars in economy. Roosevelt said in Washington: "That the budget should be actually balanced is to my mind one of the most important objectives of the incoming administration."

"The task which the president-elect has given me to do, namely, and which I have agreed to attempt, is to work out a program for balancing the federal budget."

"It is of course, the function of the president and of the congress to approve or to disapprove of the program or in part any plan which I may be able to evolve."

Word of the news and Douglas's selection was given out by Mrs. Roosevelt herself just before he left his home here late in the day to come here for a visit with Governor Lehman and a dinner of the Legislative Correspondents' association.

Mr. Roosevelt emphasized that he considered the budget office one of the most important in the government and almost on a rank with the cabinet. Senator Bull, Tennessee, in a letter to Roosevelt, said that he was undisturbed by the news.
