BABY BURNS TO DEATH AT HOME NEAR SEATTLE

SEATTLE, Feb. 24 (AP)—A 17-month-old boy, was burned to death today when fire of undetermined origin destroyed the home near Seattle.

The blaze broke out while the parents, Mrs. M. and Mrs. McCarty were absent. Two other children, Lee, 4 and John, 3, escaped from the burning structure.

McCarty, a short distance away from the home, saw the fire and tried to rescue the children, but the house was nearly consumed and the flames beat him back.

GIRL DIVES 150 FEET TO DEATH IN STREET

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 24 (AP)—Cautious pedestrians to scatter in fright today when a 10-year-old girl, who was diving from a window of a downtown office building here today and struck a parked automobile.

HAWAIIAN ELEPHANTS PLIGHT STIRS PEOPLE

HONOLULU, T. H., Feb. 24 (AP)—Hawaii's people today were stirred by a 60-day reprieve from the death sentence today, but unless somebody intervenes, the bill that the "Daisy" may be allowed to even to the extent of becoming a barbecue for Honolulu's people.

Police clamor was loud today that another chance be given the elephant, but the bill is now in the hands of the legislature and a committee to consider suggestions.

"Daisy" for years a member of the Honolulu Zoo, but in the winter of 1928 was chained to a tree. The humane society yesterday proposed to have the elephant moved to a pen and animal, but was silent today in the face of numerous protests.

Important Cities Fall as Campaign Approaches End

About 20,000 Defenders in Northeastern Part of Province Surrender to the Mikado's Troopers

General columns of Japanese troops, and their allies from the government of Manchuria, to which the troops had been ordered to advance, were seen within that North China territory.

The Japanese command of the important towns of Peipiao and Kailan—the latter in Northeast China—has been ordered to surrender to the Mikado's troops.

From these points the Japanese are preparing further thrusts deep into the province.

Resistance of the Chinese thus far has been very feeble.

About 30,000 Chinese irregulars in northeastern Jehol, in the vicinity of the main railway line, are being ordered to surrender to the Japanese command.

Strongly fortified Peipiao fell with practically no resistance.

It was revealed that the command of Lieutenant General Yamamoto, who is in command of the Japanese forces in the region, is expected to advance on the night of February 20, and after a vigorous offensive along the railway, to make contact with the Japanese command, with one man killed.

The movement gained the very valuable railway station at Peipiao, which was reported to have been captured by the Japanese command from the north.

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ROOSEVELT RELIES ON NEW YORK MAN TO AID AGRICULTURE

On Return From Albany, Incoming President Discusses Appointments With Chairman James A. Farley

By FRANCIS M. STEPHENSON (Associated Press Staff Writer) NEW YORK, Feb. 24 (AP)—President-elect Franklin D. Roosevelt today met with James A. Farley, chairman of the National Agricultural Association, to discuss the various independent agriculture agencies into a cohesive organization.

The session developed one of the most intense dramas of the history of the League. Voting by nominal roll call, the assembly voted 42 yeas to support the grave indictment of Japan contained in a report on the Manchurian situation drawn up by a special committee.

Delegates and spectators evidenced a high degree of interest in the conclusion of Mr. Matsuzaka's address. His peroration was: "I beg of you to realize the facts and see the vision of the future, to deal with us on our terms and give your confidence."

A small group of Japanese spectators applauded enthusiastically.

HOUSE INMPEACHES WESTERN FEDERAL JUDGE, 193 TO 142

Senator Borah Thinks Next Congress May Have to Repeat Action, But Some Solons Feel Otherwise

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24 (AP)—Federal Judge Harold Louderback of California was impeached today by the House of Representatives.

Five articles of impeachment, drawn up by the Senate, were adopted 193 to 142.

The impeachment vote, coming after two hours of debate, was a surprise even to sponsors of the motion.

The committee majority had contended Judge Louderback had conducted prejudicial to the dignity of the court.

It was argued vigorously by Chairman Sumners of the Judiciary committee, Laguna, New York, a Republican member, and Browning of Tennessee, a Democrat, that if Louderback were guilty of such actions as those named in the charges reported.

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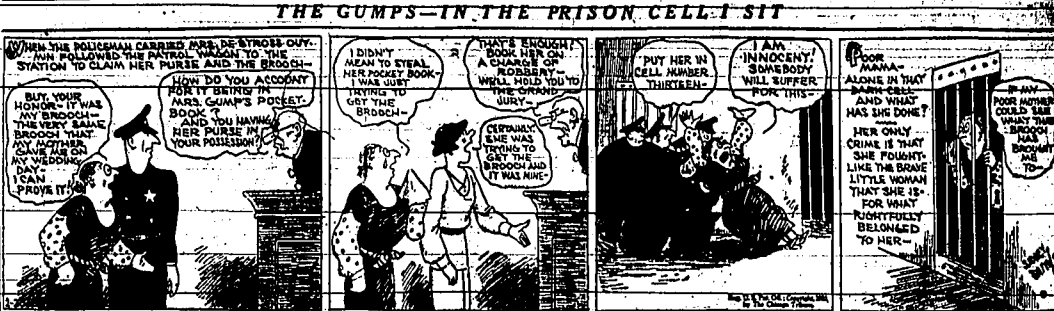

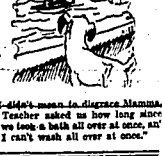

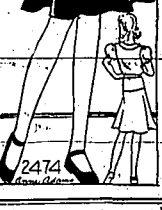
CALL FOR LIBRARY BOOKS INCREASES
