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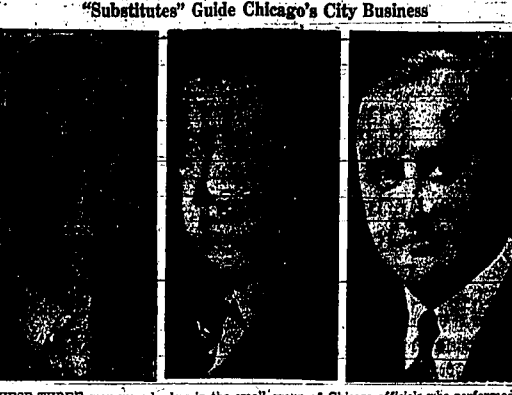



USURY LAW NEW TO LAWSUIT PRINCIPALS

Neither Clarence E. Blabac, Twin Falls photographer, and his wife, Mrs. Jessie Blabac, who are alleged to have paid interest on interest in excess of the statutory 10 per cent maximum rate, nor Mrs. A. Evelyn Simpson, Twin Falls, who is asserted to have accepted these payments, know that this transaction constituted violation of Idaho's usury laws, according to their testimony at hearing in a foreclosure suit in the district court here yesterday. The case was set up by J. H. Barnes, attorney for the Blabacs, as a defense in the suit which Mrs. Blabac brought to foreclose a \$1800 note and mortgage covering the Blabac studio on Second street east. It is a total of \$1000 interest in excess of the legal limit, in excess of the legal limit, that was written agreement providing for a higher interest rate. In event the usury claim is sustained, according to the Blabacs' attorney, all claim for interest on the mortgage debt would be forfeited, and the Blabacs would be forced to pay the principal in the sum of all interest payments that have been made.


