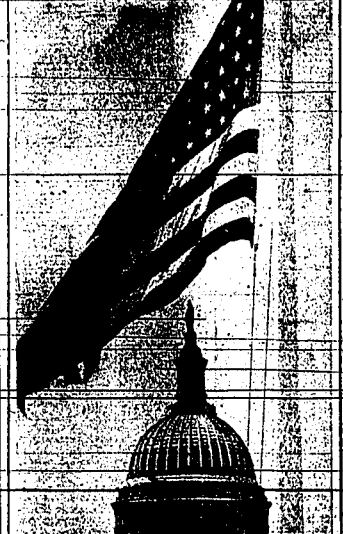

The first thought of closing in general was to provide sufficient cash for credits and routine expenses. Although the suspension of business normally is transacted by check, banks are unable to do so.

The New York stock exchange and the Chicago board of trade, largest financial organizations respectively in securities and grain futures, were closed and so were smaller markets of the kind, including all stock and bond markets.

The average citizen's chief trouble is the difficulty of cashing paychecks. Stores generally extended credit more liberally for making of purchases.

Smaller merchants developed a fear that their supplies of cash would run short and, accordingly, they increased currency larger than \$10 in denomination.

Small banks collecting bodies reported increased revenue for the day as taxpayers took advantage of provisions for limited withdrawal regulations which permitted large withdrawals.

AN AGREEMENT

In the bill which recently passed the House and Senate, declaring a moratorium on Reclamation Project payments for 1931, addition to the bill in the shape of Congressional action, which expressed in terms of money, will amount to over \$100 million dollars.

Farmers on Federal reclamation projects in Southern Idaho will be relieved of payments of this amount for the year 1931. The bill has passed both House and Senate and Presidential signature is not likely to be withheld.

The accomplishment brings to a fitting close a career of Public Service of nearly forty years, twenty of which were spent in Congress. Deceased in the last election Congressman Smith was not permitted the fact to interfere in the final work of his work program. As a final gesture he was able to see the bill through and to sign it.

PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT

With arms and eyes open to the people of the United States, President Roosevelt has been commended more widespread attention than any similar speech within memory.

Moreover, a great majority of those who listened probably approved of a government program which will have the effect of bringing to an end a period of business and financial chaos which admittedly must be brought to an end if the present system is to survive.

Congress is to be called into special session at once and work completed under the unwavering of the tangled skein. There must be unity of thought and action as between the President and Congress if the branches in the interests of a program which will be both harmonious and drastic. In the event of lack of full co-operation dictatorial powers are to be assumed by the President with a presidential program is to be inaugurated on a dictatorship basis.

It is apparent that President Roosevelt is fully aware of the necessity of immediate financial reforms and that the present system is to be replaced by a more equitable one. Whether this reform will take the form of a re-organization of silver, establishing a dual monetary system, comparison from the gold standard, the use of paper money, the use of money value or plain inflation is not made clear. But there is no question of the President's determination to take some form of action to stabilize the situation. In past years, the actions of the President have been limited to the power of human language.

There was a notable absence of reference to either party of the rising specter of a mass party. Neither it would appear that the Presidential conception of the situation is based upon the necessity of the day are more important than either the future of the past and that the task ahead is immediate and pressing.

There is every disposition in the world to accord to President Roosevelt a measure of confidence and it is probably safe to assume that the new Congress is ready to follow the leadership.

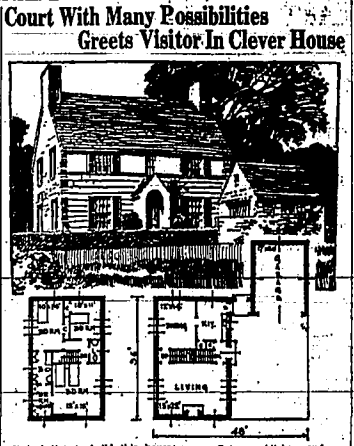
