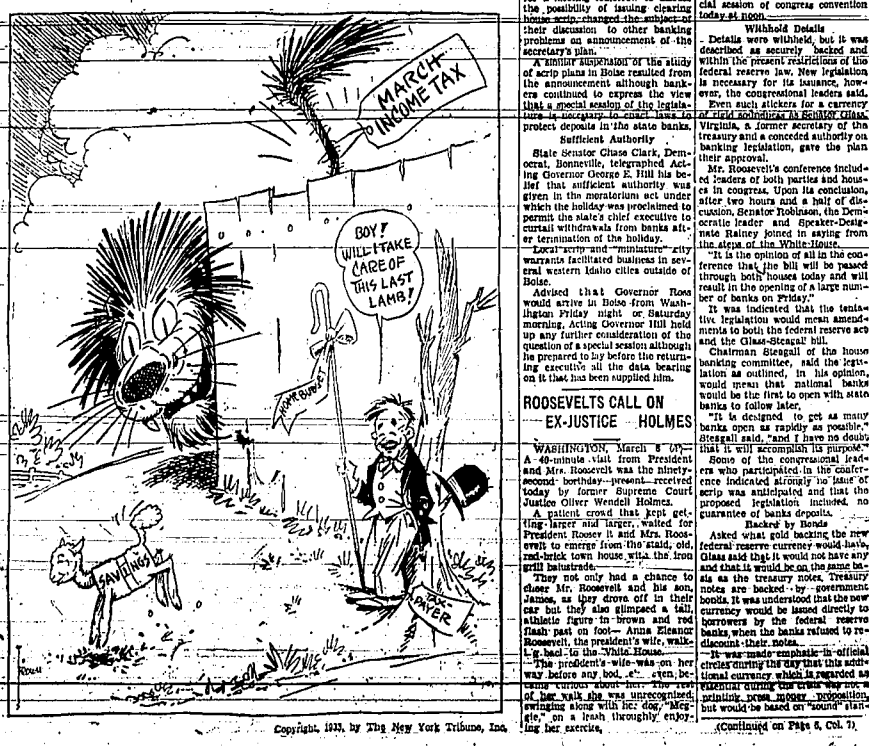

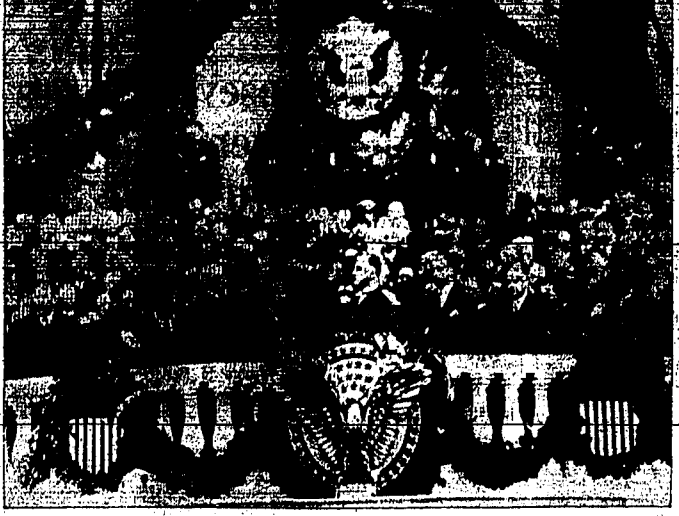

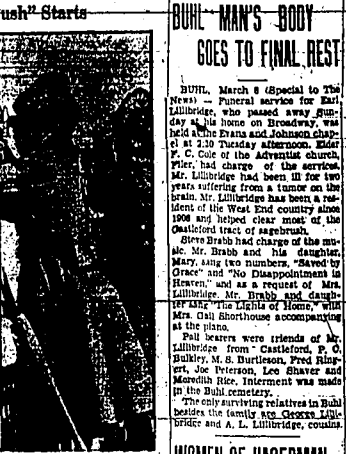

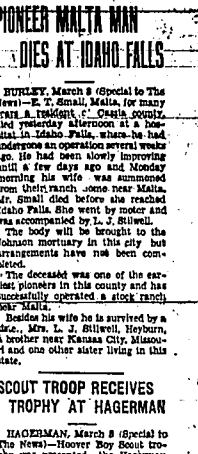

WILBUR HOLDS TO MINIDOKA DECISION

Secretary of Interior Refuses to Allow Credits to Irrigation District

BURL, March 8 (Special to The News)—Announcement that he declines to reverse the decision of the United States court in Portland, Ore., refusing to allow credits to the Minidoka Irrigation district for water sold to the former Secretary of the Interior Ray Wilbur, was received from Secretary of the Irrigation District E. B. Darling, Tuesday. Secretary Wilbur maintains that there were no profits accruing from sale of 100,000 acre feet of stored water to some 15 private canal companies in Snake river valley, alleging that, the sale was made in order to save the water sold would have to be replaced by more expensive water from the Minidoka project. He pointed out that the American Falls project is a water project. It is alleged that all facts submitted by the attorney for Minidoka Irrigation district, which have been before the supreme court of the District of Columbia, are identical with those submitted, the court having tried the case and decided against the district.

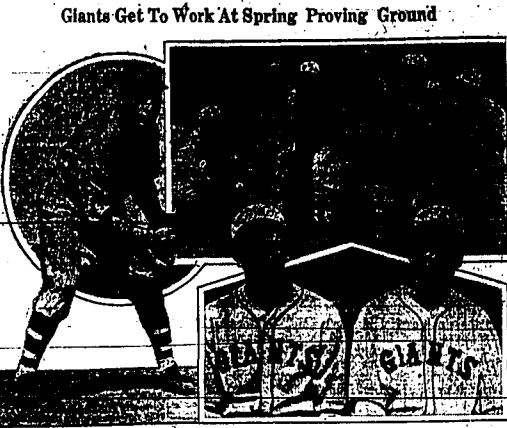

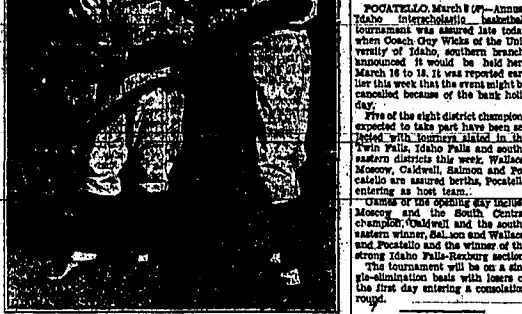

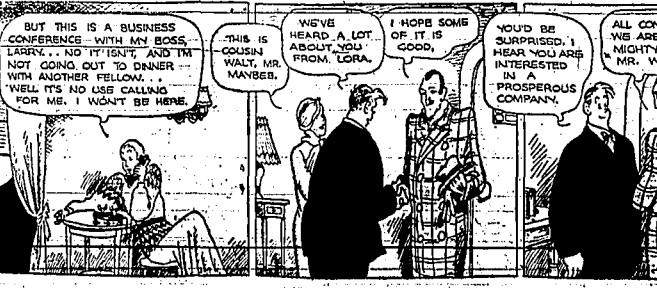
