# FIRES IN CITIES ADD TO TERRORS OF CATASTROPHE

(Continued From Page One)

The tables upon which were stretched the victims.

The whole area affected by the destructive convulsions of the earth's strata made it extremely difficult to make a survey of the toll in lives and property.

**Recurrent Shocks**

Recurrent shocks added new dangers as attempts were made to check.

**Fires in widely separated areas.**

In several communities schoolhouses were burned, while an oil well in the west—near the Union Oil refinery in the harbor district.

In the southwest section of Los Angeles there was a number of fires.

Hundreds of Japanese men, women and children fled from their land, between San Pedro and Long Beach, facing a tidal wave. Carrying household goods and furniture, they made their way to the mainland and slept in the foothills.

Fireboats reported a passenger train operating on a schedule. Inspectors rode ahead of Southern Pacific trains on gasoline cars to examine tracks and tunnels.

Huntington Park, a small community with a large business district, immediately after the southwest industrial section of Los Angeles was under stricken.

Several schools were recovered from the ruins within four hours of the first quake. Some reports were that at least twice as many lives were lost there. No estimate could be made of the number of injured.

The Huntington Park high school was destroyed by fire, and reports of damage ran as high as two million dollars for the community.

Efforts of firemen to combat the high school blaze were futile, finally dynamite was used to break down the walls.

One of the reports on the "honey beach" was that the advertising department of the Long Beach Press-Tribune was destroyed.

A fire on Willow street at the foot of Signal hill on the eastern side of the city was kindled, and a man was thrown violently from side to side when the embankment of the east side of the road gave way a moment later and toppled into the street.

Several houses were destroyed by fire.

Next he heard an explosion and saw flames shooting up from an oil derrick on the west side of Atlantic street in San Antonio.

Within a short time a dozen derricks were blazing like fire, and most of them toppled over.

Admiral R. H. Leigh, commanding the United States fleet, sent word to the Long Beach and 100 into Compton tonight and said he expected to save 1000 or more houses and working in Long Beach by morning. He has 20,000 men available for rescue work.

Dudley Steele, member of the Los Angeles police air reserve unit, took off in a biplane and made a survey of the Long Beach, Compton and San Pedro areas, reporting that the damage they could be given immediate attention.

In Beverly Hills and Hollywood district store windows were broken and merchandise upset, with dishes broken in homes, but there were no reports of severe damage or loss of life or injuries.

At the receiving hospital, it was estimated at 100 to 200 that 1000 persons had been treated during the first hour after the tremor and that the injured had been admitted at the rate of 700 in an hour steadily, in a total at that time of more than 3000.

Of these about 200 had been hurt jumping from windows, 100 struck by falling books and other articles, 100 hurt by falling chimneys and 100 by explosions and fires.

Of about 1000 to 2000 surrounding the institutions, some on stretchers, not all of course, were injured.

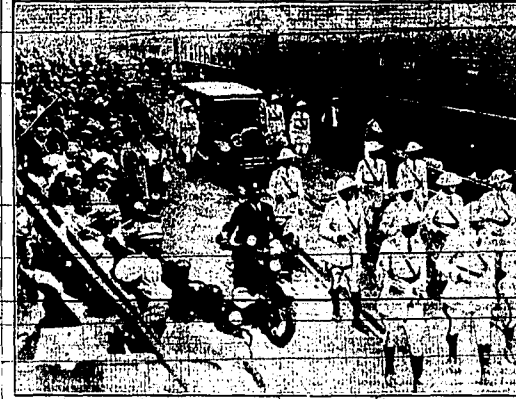
