Boise Appears On Bank List

BOISE, March 13 (AP)—Boise appears to have been listed in the late today of cities in which licensed banks would be allowed to reopen for normal business tomorrow.

The list contained 19 cities, nine in California, three in Washington, 10 in Utah and one each in Arizona, Idaho, Oregon, and Nevada. These are the seven states which comprise the Twelfth federal reserve district, which is served by the Federal Reserve Bank, San Francisco.

The cities are: Phoenix, Arizona; Fresno, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Oakland, San Diego, San Francisco, San Jose and Stockton, California; Boise, Idaho; Portland, Tacoma, Seattle, Spokane, Tacoma, Washington; Reno, Nevada.

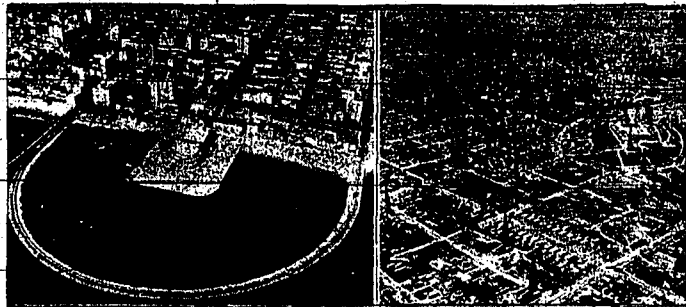

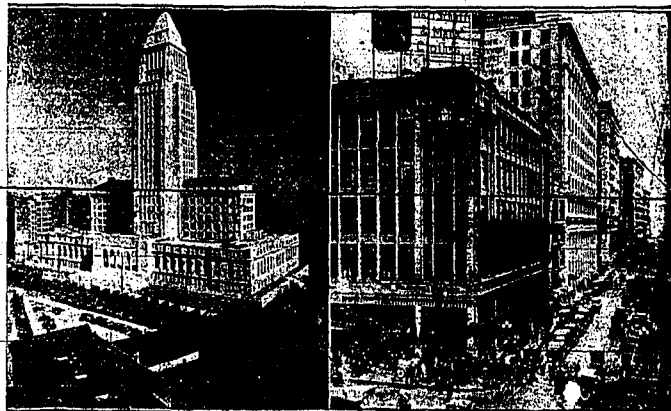

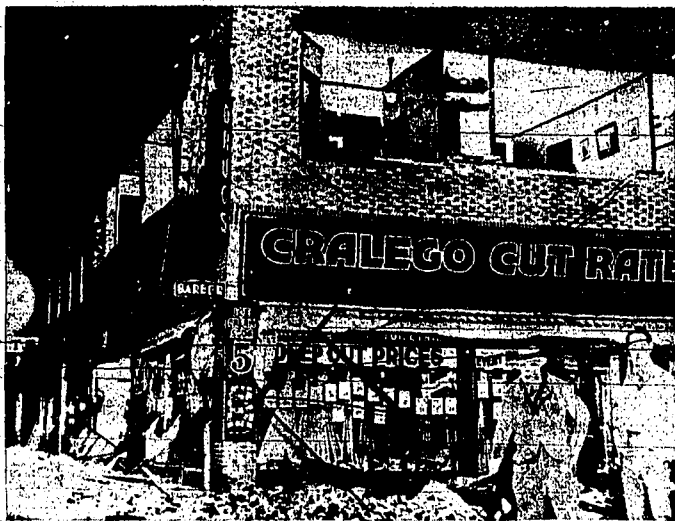

A few hours after the tragedy 80 were reported dead with more than 2800 injured. The tremors were felt over an area 20 miles wide and 200 miles long.
