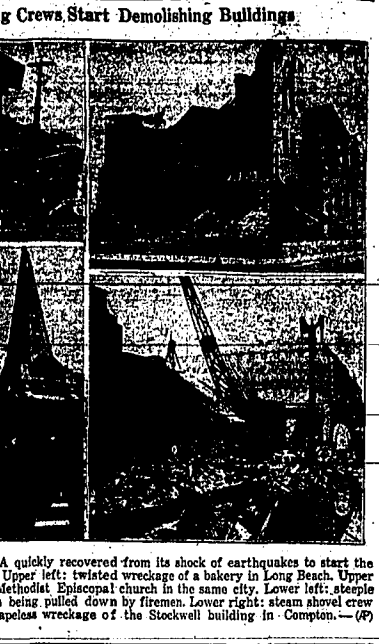

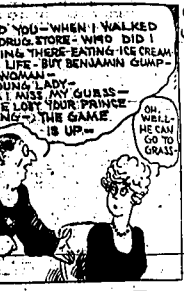
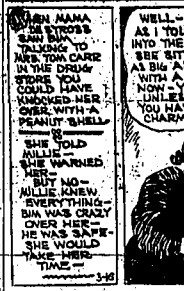

### BOARD REMOVES COUNTY HOSPITAL SUPERINTENDENT

County Commissioners divide, two-to-one on proposed sale or lease of institution, and on Ouster

Dividing two to one, on two resolutions presented by Twin Falls county commissioners, a motion to sell the county general hospital, or lease it for a period of five years, and then adopt a motion to remove the hospital superintendent, who has been in charge of the institution for two years, and place a man in charge for a period of 90 days.

The superintendent, Miss Georgia M. Maxwell has three times been called to account for the institution since it was established in 1917, being recalled the last time in January 1932, following an internal investigation of approximately one and one-half years. The commissioners' motion for the removal of the superintendent did not designate a successor.

Commissioners' action yesterday afternoon was taken on a resolution passed by a 2-1 vote on a motion signed by all seven Twin Falls county physicians, stating that the hospital management was becoming increasingly unsatisfactory, and urging removal of the present superintendent.

In all cases, one of the bank's officials said yesterday, gold was returned in relatively small amounts.

It was the next morning, after he and his friends had gone to a tourist camp for breakfast that he saw the first line of city dwellers fleeing into the open to escape falling debris.

Mrs. R. O. Keith, former Twin Falls resident, ran from a Long Beach, California grocery store in time to see a brick wall and wooden floor in the street when the first earthquake shock struck southern California last Friday evening. Describing the experience in a letter to Mrs. E. M. White, Twin Falls, Mrs. Keith said:

"I was in a grocery when it happened, and everything started to fall on me or at me—I screamed and ran to the ceiling and got out in time to see a brick wall go across the street, where it hardly was a whole thing in town, with the exception of some of the new down town steel structures. It knocked off our chimney, upset the electric refrigerator and broke most of the dishes, and cracked the house in general."

Mrs. Keith had gone to Monday night—second night after the earthquake, said this on a friendly note to get telephone communication to Long Beach, she tells of the extensive property damage, but notes that "no one in the building where I was was hurt and it is quite remarkable, the few deaths all over town."

Mr. and Mrs. Keith left Twin Falls in 1922, after living here for five years, and went to California where they have since made their home.
